Field Marshal visits NDU, discusses evolving global, regional and internal security challenges

Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir, NI (M), HJ, COAS & CDF, visited the National Defence University (NDU), Islamabad today, where he was briefed by panel of civil and military participants of ongoing National Security and War Course on their academic perspective about challenges to national security and imperatives for overcoming them.

In his interaction, the Field Marshal outlined the complex and evolving global, regional and internal security environment, emphasizing that the country faces broad and persistent challenges. He noted that these challenges span conventional, sub-conventional, intelligence, cyber, information, military, economic and other domains, requiring comprehensive multi-domain preparedness,

continuous adaptation and synergy amongst all elements of national power.

The Field Marshal highlighted that hostile elements increasingly employ indirect and ambiguous approaches, including the use of proxies to exploit internal fault lines, rather than overt confrontation. He stressed that future leaders must be trained and remain alert to recognize, anticipate, and counter such multi-layered cognitive challenges.

Concluding his address, the Field Marshal appreciated the panels' sharp analysis and conclusions and urged the participants to remain vigilant, adaptive, and steadfast in upholding the values of integrity, discipline, and selfless service.

Upon arrival, the COAS & CDF was warmly received by the President NDU.

Arif Habib consortium acquires PLA with Rs135bn bid

ISLAMABAD: The Arif Habib Group-led consortium secured Pakistan International Airlines in the privatisation process on Tuesday with a top bid of Rs135 billion, ahead of the Lucky Cement-led consortium's Rs134 billion offer. The final bids were opened in Islamabad in the presence of government officials, consortium representatives and the media, concluding a staged and publicly televised process for the sale of a 75% stake in the national carrier.

Following the announcement, Shahid Habib of the Arif Habib consortium termed the outcome "a win for Pakistan," describing the transaction as the country's largest to date.

Under the deal, PIA employees will receive job protection for one year. Officials said salaries and existing benefits of around 6,500 employees will remain intact during this period.

The successful bid follows earlier rounds in which the Arif Habib consortium had led with offers of Rs115 billion and



later Rs121 billion, while the Lucky Cement consortium had submitted bids of Rs101.5 billion and Rs120.25 billion, respectively.

Airblue was the third bidder in the process.

According to the Privatisation Commission, the winning bidder will also have the option to acquire the remaining 25% stake within 90 days at a 12% premium, with payment allowed after one year.

Officials reiterated that the successful investor would be required to inject at least Rs80 billion over the next five years to stabilise operations and improve the airline's performance.

Federal Cabinet approves PIA privatisation decisions

ISLAMABAD: The federal cabinet, chaired by Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif, on Tuesday approved key decisions related to the privatisation of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA), and reiterated the government's firm commitment to transparency, political dialogue and economic reform.

A special meeting of the federal cabinet was held here at the Prime Minister's House, during which the cabinet formally endorsed the decisions taken earlier in the day by the Cabinet Committee on Privatisation regarding PIA, a Prime Minister's Office news release said.



The cabinet also offered prayers for the smooth and successful

completion of all stages of the privatisation process.

Addressing the cabinet, Prime

Minister Shehbaz Sharif underscored that the PIA privatisation would be carried out in a transparent, credible and reliable manner, noting that the bidding process would be broadcast live on television. He said sealed bids would be placed in see-through boxes, with envelopes opened only after price determination, and the award would be made through a competitive process to the highest bidder.

"This is one of the largest financial transactions in Pakistan's history, and therefore the entire process must be transparent and credible," the prime minister said, adding that the outcome of the bidding would

be brought back to the cabinet for final approval. He urged cabinet members to actively participate so decisions could be taken with collective wisdom.

The prime minister appreciated the efforts of the relevant ministries and cabinet members in advancing the privatisation agenda, particularly commending the roles of the deputy prime minister, defence minister and finance minister. He described the day as significant for PIA's future and expressed confidence that a transparent process would improve economic management and boost private-sector confidence.

Strategic leadership, national resilience drive Pakistan's global successes: Khawaja Asif

PM says govt open to talks with PTI, rules out blackmail

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has said that the government is ready for talks with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf on legitimate issues, however, blackmailing under the guise of talks is not acceptable under any circumstances.

Prime minister's remarks came during a federal cabinet meeting on Tuesday, where key political and economic issues of the country came under discussion.

Addressing the meeting, Prime Minister Sharif emphasised that the PTI had been

invited for dialogue in the past and was still welcome for negotiations to foster political harmony for national prosperity.

The prime minister reiterated that he had also extended invitations for dialogue on the floor of the National Assembly and remains committed to engaging with all political parties for the country's welfare.

On the occasion, Prime Minister Sharif also lauded Field Marshal Asim Munir for receiving the King Abdulaziz Award in Saudi Arabia, describing it as an honour not just for the Field Marshal but for the entire nation.

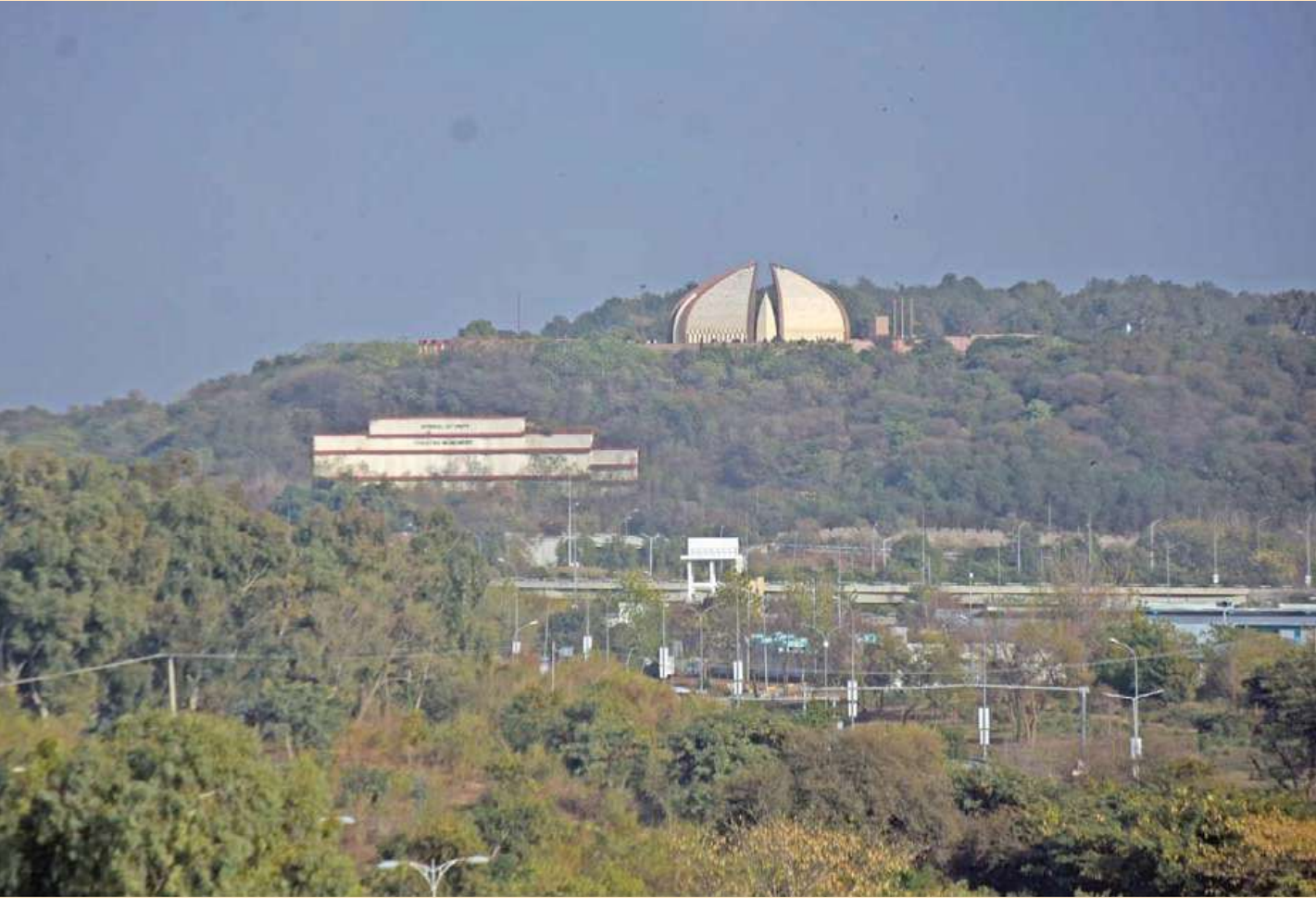

Kashmir Leader Slams Bihar CM for Forcibly Pulling Muslim Woman's Niqab

RAWALPINDI: President of the All Jammu and Kashmir Muslim Conference and former Prime Minister of Azad Jammu and Kashmir, Sardar Attique Ahmad Khan, has vehemently condemned the act of Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar for forcibly pulling the veil (niqab) of a Muslim woman during a public event. He termed the incident a blatant violation of human dignity, religious freedom, and fundamental

human rights, and demanded an unconditional public apology from the Bihar Chief Minister.

Talking to the media in Rawalpindi after a dinner hosted by Sardar Sajjad Abbasi, Sardar Attique Ahmad Khan said that publicly humiliating Dr. Nusrat Parveen is unacceptable, shameful, and reflective of a narrow-minded and oppressive mindset. He stated that forcibly removing a woman's veil is an assault on her personal freedom, religious beliefs, and Eastern cultural values.

He said the incident has once again exposed the so-called democratic and secular face of India, adding that the continued mistreatment of Muslims—particularly Muslim women—has become a deeply alarming trend. He said that Kashmiris expressed full solidarity with Dr. Nusrat Parveen and said that violations of religious freedom in India should be a matter of serious concern for the international community.

Sardar Attique Ahmad Khan urged the United Nations, OIC, international human rights organizations, and the independent global media to exert pressure on India to ensure protection of minority rights, respect religious freedom, and take effective action against those responsible for humiliating women and violating their dignity. He warned that the international community's silence over injustices against minorities in India, including in Kashmir, amounts to criminal negligence and that such incidents pose serious threats to regional peace and stability.

World Health Coverage Day

Cleft Hospital & The Spokesman highlight inclusive healthcare in Pakistan

The event underscored the importance of universal access to healthcare and highlighted the role of specialized non-profit institutions in bridging gaps within Pakistan’s health sector.

Cleft Hospital Pakistan, a specialized non-profit healthcare facility, has emerged as the country’s leading center dedicated exclusively to the treatment of cleft lip, cleft palate and associated cranio-facial deformities. Through its integrated medical approach, international collaborations and humanitarian mission, the hospital has become a symbol of hope for children born with facial anomalies.

The foundation of Cleft Hospital Pakistan traces back to the vision of Dr. Ijaz Bashir, a distinguished plastic and reconstructive surgeon. During his early medical career, Dr. Bashir encountered numerous children suffering from cleft conditions who lacked access to consistent and comprehensive treatment. Realizing that short-term surgical camps were insufficient for long-term rehabilitation, he conceptualized a permanent, purpose-built hospital that could provide lifelong care to cleft

patients. This vision materialized in 2010, when the hospital was formally established on the Grand Trunk Road in Juliani, Gujrat.

“Cleft Hospital Gujrat: Restoring Smiles, Transforming Lives”

Before the hospital’s inception, organized cleft care in Pakistan was largely provided through the Pakistan Cleft Lip and Palate Association (PCLAPA), which conducted periodic surgical missions with the support of foreign surgeons. While impactful, these initiatives highlighted the urgent need for a permanent institution. Cleft Hospital was thus founded as a continuation and expansion of these early efforts, offering year-round services under one roof. Now, the hospital offering a comprehensive range of medical services essential for complete cleft rehabilitation. At its core is a dedicated Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery Department, which performs corrective surgeries for cleft lip, cleft palate and related facial deformities using internationally accepted protocols. These procedures are carefully timed and tailored according to the patient’s age and clinical needs, ensuring optimal functional and aesthetic outcomes.

Recognizing that cleft care extends far beyond surgery, the hospital operates a fully integrated multidisciplinary model. Specialized dental and orthodontic services address tooth alignment and jaw development, while audiology services assess and manage hearing impairments commonly associated with cleft conditions. A well-established speech and language therapy unit plays a crucial role in helping children develop clear and confident speech following surgical repair. The hospital

also houses pediatric and ENT services, ensuring comprehensive medical oversight for young patients. Nutritional guidance is provided to families, particularly for infants who face feeding difficulties due to cleft palate. In addition, psychological counseling is offered to support patients and parents coping with the emotional and social challenges associated with facial deformities.

Beyond clinical care, Cleft Hospital Pakistan has positioned itself as a center for research and professional training. Its research department, established in 2015, focuses on studying the causes, patterns and management of cleft conditions within the Pakistani population. The hospital regularly hosts workshops, symposia and training programs for surgeons, speech therapists and allied health professionals, contributing to capacity building in cleft care nationwide. What truly distinguishes Cleft Hospital is its humanitarian ethos. Operating as a non-profit institution, it provides treatment at minimal or no cost to patients who cannot afford care. The hospital serves individuals from all provinces of Pakistan, as well as neighboring regions, making it a national referral center for cleft management. Support from international medical volunteers and charitable organizations has further strengthened its ability to deliver services that meet global standards.

Over the years, tens of thousands of surgeries and therapies have been carried out at the hospital, each representing a restored smile and a renewed sense of dignity. By combining surgical excellence with long-term rehabilitation, education and research, Cleft Hospital

Pakistan has set a benchmark for specialized healthcare in the country. As Pakistan continues to face challenges in access to specialized medical services, institutions like Cleft Hospital Gujrat stand as powerful examples of how vision, compassion and professionalism can transform lives—one smile at a time.

Earlier, Dr. Ijaz Bashir delivered a detailed multimedia presentation outlining the journey, achievements and future vision of Cleft Hospital Pakistan. He shared key statistics on patient outreach, surgical success rates and multidisciplinary care outcomes, while also highlighting the hospital’s growing emphasis on research, training and prevention. Dr. Bashir emphasized that cleft treatment is a long-term process that requires sustained support, often spanning several years of a child’s development. Dr. Ijaz Bashir: A Life Devoted to Healing Smiles

Dr. Ijaz Bashir, founder of the Pakistan Cleft Lip & Palate Association (PCLAPA) and the Ayesha Bashir Trust Hospital—widely known as Cleft Hospital Pakistan—has dedicated his life to restoring hope and smiles to children born with cleft lips and palates. Alongside this, he also established the Decent Welfare Society, marking decades of selfless service to humanity. Born into a prosperous family, Dr. Bashir could have led a life of comfort. Yet destiny guided him to a path of compassion, service, and unwavering commitment to those in need.

From the early 1990s, Dr. Bashir immersed himself in welfare work, always crediting Allah, his family, and friends for his achievements. “A welfare mission is never the work of a single person,” he often reflects. “It grows from family values, strengthened by quiet support, and sustained by gratitude.”

Dr. Bashir hails from the well-known Decent family of Gujrat, famous for Decent Furniture. He is one of six brothers, and while his siblings pursued the family business, his father, Mirza Muhammad Bashir, freed him from commercial responsibilities, encouraging him to study medicine. From an early age, his mother, Begum Ayesha Bashir, prayed that Allah would make her son a doctor dedicated to the service of humanity. This heartfelt prayer

became the guiding foundation of his life. Completing his MBBS in 1987, Dr. Bashir devoted himself fully to humanitarian work.

The journey was made possible by his family’s support. His younger brother, Mirza Ashfaq Bashir, actively contributed to welfare work despite his business commitments. His wife, Samiya Ijaz, quietly held the household together while supporting him in his mission. Today, their children continue the family tradition of service, ensuring that compassion spans generations.

Humanitarian work demands total dedication, patience, and personal sacrifice. With family support and

freedom from commercial obligations, Dr. Bashir could devote himself fully. The first pivotal moment came when British-Pakistani plastic surgeon Dr. Amanullah Raja introduced him to a child born with a cleft lip and palate. The child’s parents, overwhelmed with worry, could not afford treatment. Dr. Bashir arranged the necessary surgery, and when the child smiled for the first time after a successful operation, he made a solemn promise: no cleft patient would ever be denied treatment due to poverty or circumstance. This encounter ignited a life-long mission fueled by compassion and determination.

Initially, free cleft camps were organized under the Decent Welfare Society. As the need grew, it became clear that temporary camps were not enough. This led to the formation of PCLAPA in 1995, formally registered in 2000, expanding from annual to biannual camps that reached more children each year.

International collaboration strengthened the mission. In 1997, a six-member medical team led by British surgeon Dr. Nicholas B. Hart joined. Later, in 2004, British-Pakistani plastic surgeon Dr. Muhammad Riaz and anesthetist Dr. Zahid Rafiq further enhanced the organization’s clinical capabilities.

Recognizing the need for a permanent facility, Dr. Bashir’s family

donated 22 kanals of commercial land on Gujrat’s Grand Trunk Road. The Ayesha Bashir Complex now houses PCLAPA’s head office and the Ayesha Bashir Trust Hospital. In 2010, Japanese-Pakistani philanthropist Mrs. Orita supported construction of the ground floor. Khawaja Muhammad Aslam of Midland International Aid Trust ensured essential resources for patient care. In 2016, Dr. Abdul Rashid Gatrad sponsored two additional floors in memory of his mother,

Jubaida Gatrad.

Dr. Abdul Rashid Gatrad and the late Khawaja Muhammad Islam, both British citizens of subcontinental origin, provided critical support when the hospital’s patient numbers surged. Pakistani-German philanthropist Anita Khawaja and many others—including Mian Ghulam Mohiuddin, Muhammad Shafiq, Umair Rafiq, Chaudhry Mubashir Hussain, Chaudhry Nadeem Akhtar Malhi, Idrees Azad, and Gulraiz

Nabi—helped turn the hospital into a beacon of hope.

Today, Cleft Hospital Pakistan serves patients from across the country and around the world. Every child is welcomed with dignity, respect, and a promise of quality care. Long-term partnerships with Midland International Aid Trust and the Overseas Plastic Surgery Appeal continue to sustain this mission. Dr. Bashir emphasizes that this work is a collective journey, with every supporter, volunteer, and donor embodying compassion in action.

From small free camps to a fully equipped hospital, PCLAPA has treated more than 28,000 patients, many of whom remain under ongoing care. Beyond clinical services, the organization contributes to research and is preparing to establish a dedicated cleft training center to educate future generations of medical professionals.

For Dr. Bashir, every smile restored represents more than medical success—it embodies hope, resilience, and the transformative power of human kindness. His journey from that first child patient to thousands of treated children today reflects the profound impact of faith, family, and collective goodwill. Dr. Ijaz Bashir’s life is a testament to selfless service, showing how dedication and compassion can heal both hearts and lives.

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CCG finds Kashmir gripped by a climate of ‘sullen silence’

It is an established fact that human rights are being violated on a daily basis across every part of Jammu and Kashmir. Multiple international human rights organizations and United Nations Special Rapporteurs have documented the absence of meaningful freedom of expression in Jammu and Kashmir. Independent civil society findings indicate widespread censorship, intimidation, arbitrary detention, and harassment of journalists, civil society members, religious leaders, and ordinary citizens. Speaking openly about developments in the region carries a high risk of detention under laws such as the Public Safety Act (PSA) and the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA). Local Kashmiris continue to face humiliation, intimidation, and harassment at the hands of Indian military and paramilitary forces. These findings have been independently verified by a well-respected and reputable New Delhi-based organization, the Concerned Citizens Group (CCG). The CCG comprises prominent and distinguished Indian political leaders, retired senior military officials, and representatives of civil society.

The group visited Jammu and Kashmir from October 28 to 31, 2025, and subsequently released its 11th report on the region. Members of the delegation included Yashwant Sinha, former Minister of Finance and Minister of External Affairs of India; Sushobha Barve, Executive Director of the Centre for Dialogue and Reconciliation; Air Vice Marshal (Retd.) Kapil Kak, a Kashmiri by birth and former Deputy Director at the Centre for Air Power Studies; and Bharat Bhushan, one of India’s most seasoned journalists.

The CCG categorically emphasized that it has no affiliation with the Government of India or with any political party. Its visits to Jammu and Kashmir are entirely self-financed by its members, and it does not solicit contributions from any organization, including NGOs.

The CCG was formed in the aftermath of the large-scale protests that erupted in the Kashmir Valley in 2016. Its stated mission is to act as a bridge between Jammu and Kashmir and the rest of India. The primary objective of its recent visit was to gauge the public mood at the grassroots level and to convey to the wider Indian public the genuine sentiments of the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

According to the report, the activities of the CCG were significantly restricted by the police. The group sought to meet a broad cross-section of society to obtain an objective and accurate assessment of the prevailing situation but was prevented from doing so. In several instances, police reportedly instructed individuals not to appear before the CCG. Despite these constraints, the delegation managed to meet senior leadership of the National Conference, Indian National Congress, and the Communist Party of India (Marxist), as well as representatives of the Kashmir Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Jammu and Kashmir Students’ Association, and members of the media. Additionally, they met Mirwaiz Umar Farooq, a prominent Muslim religious leader, and Sanjay Ticku, a well-known Hindu leader.

When Capitalism Gives Back

Capitalism, at its core, is a system built on freedom—the freedom to compete, to innovate, and to accumulate wealth without an upper limit imposed by the state. In a free-market economy, every individual has the right to amass as much wealth as talent, timing, risk-taking, and opportunity allow. Nowhere is this reality more visible than in the United States, where capitalism has produced astonishing prosperity alongside extreme concentration of wealth.

The scale of that concentration is often difficult to comprehend. The combined wealth of America’s ten richest individuals rivals—or exceeds—the total economic output of many developing nations, and is comparable to the GDP of more than a dozen smaller countries combined. At the same time, that wealth equals the collective net worth of tens of millions of ordinary Americans. This stark imbalance is frequently cited as evidence of capitalism’s moral failure. Yet this is only half the story.

History shows that capitalism is not merely a machine for accumulation; it is also a system that, at its most mature stage, often turns inward—forcing its greatest beneficiaries to confront uncomfortable questions about meaning, legacy, and responsibility.

Michael and Susan Dell have pledged an extraordinary sum—approximately \$6.2 billion—toward an initiative designed to fundamentally alter the financial starting point of American children. The vision is both simple and radical: to open an investment account for every child born between 2025 and 2028, seeded at birth and invested in broad-based index funds. By the time a child reaches adulthood, this account could exceed \$100,000, usable for higher education, home ownership, or launching a business. If left untouched

until mid-adulthood, the value could rise several-fold—potentially surpassing \$700,000.

This is not a handout in the conventional sense. It is not welfare, nor is it consumption-driven assistance. It is capital formation—distributed at birth.

What makes this initiative particularly striking is its momentum. Following the Dell announcement, other philanthropists and corporate beneficiaries of the American capitalist system have begun making similar pledges. What began as a single act of generosity is rapidly evolving into a movement—one that channels private wealth into a nationwide social investment framework.

If implemented at scale, the implications are profound.

For millions of families—rich and poor alike—the crushing financial anxiety associated with raising children could be dramatically reduced. Parents struggle to fund education, navigate healthcare costs, support young adults through early adulthood, and prepare children for a competitive world. This initiative shifts part of that burden from households to a class of individuals who benefited most from the system itself.

In effect, capitalism would be financing its own social correction.

Children who once would have been locked out of higher education due to lack of funds could now pursue academic excellence without lifelong debt. Young adults could start businesses without mortgaging their future. Families could enter marriage and parenthood with financial resilience rather than fear. Emergencies—medical, economic, or personal—could be met without catastrophic consequences.

From a macroeconomic perspective, this is seed capital for the nation itself. Millions of small endowments compounding over decades would translate into higher productivity, increased entrepreneurship, and greater social stability. In theory, it is a virtuous cycle: wealth creates opportunity; opportunity creates productivity; productivity sustains growth.

Yet for all its promise, this intervention raises a question that must not be ignored.

Struggle has always been a powerful engine of human development. Scarcity forces creativity. Hardship cultivates resilience. The absence of safety nets often compels individuals to innovate, persevere, and build character through adversity. Many of history’s most successful entrepreneurs, thinkers, and leaders were forged in environments of constraint rather than comfort.

This initiative introduces an unprecedented level of financial security at birth. While it removes destructive poverty, it may also reduce the constructive pressure that fuels ambition. The concern is not whether children will become lazy—an oversimplification—but whether the psychological edge that comes from necessity will be blunted. Will guaranteed capital reduce risk-taking, or will it empower smarter risk-taking? Will it foster entrepreneurship, or dilute hunger?

These are not ideological questions; they are empirical ones.

Before such an intervention is expanded nationwide, rigorous longitudinal studies must be conducted. Policymakers, economists, behavioral scientists, and educators must examine whether early financial security enhances produc-

tivity or dampens drive. The effects may differ across communities, cultures, and income brackets. The same intervention that liberates one child may unintentionally limit another.

The stakes are enormous. This is not a pilot program affecting thousands; it is a structural change that could shape the character of an entire generation.

And yet, despite these uncertainties, one truth remains undeniable.

Capitalism, when left to accumulate unchecked, produces inequality. But when its greatest beneficiaries consciously redirect wealth toward collective uplift, it can also produce social renewal on a scale no state-driven redistribution has ever achieved. What is unfolding in the United States today is not the abandonment of capitalism—it is its moral maturation.

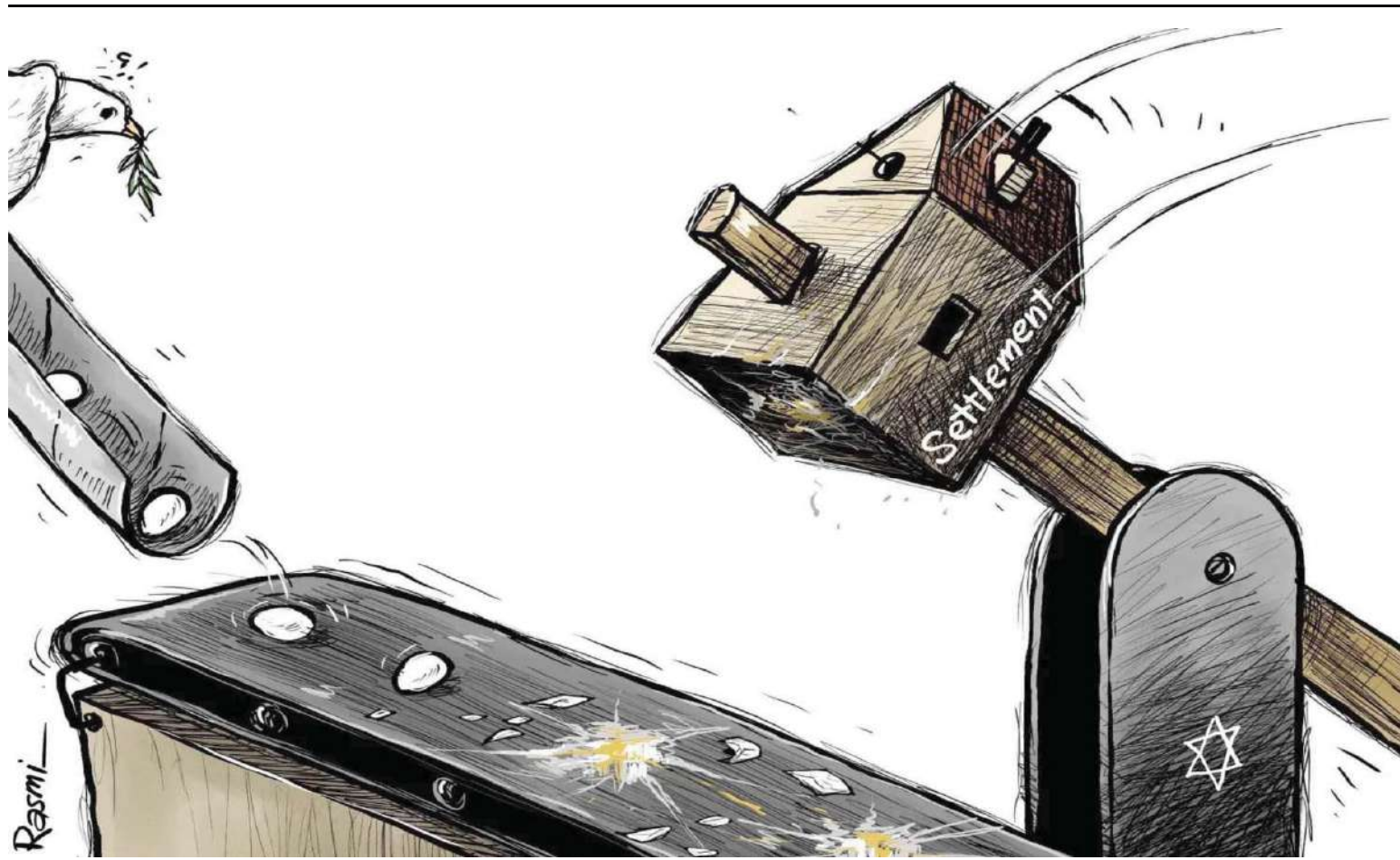
The wealthy are not being coerced. They are volunteering. The system is not being dismantled; it is being refined. Wealth earned through free markets is returning to society not as charity alone, but as structured opportunity—invested in the future rather than consumed in the present.

America’s greatness has always rested on its ability to reinvent itself without destroying its foundations. If this initiative succeeds, it may stand as one of the most consequential innovations in social policy—not imposed by government fiat, but enabled by private conscience.

Whether it becomes a triumph or a cautionary tale depends on one thing: the willingness to study its impact honestly before scaling it irrevocably.

Capitalism has planted the seed. Wisdom must decide how it grows.

The Fall of Dhaka

The fall of Dhaka is one of the most tragic chapters in the history of Pakistan, representing not merely a territorial loss but also a profound political, intellectual, and moral failure. On December 16, 1971, the separation of East Pakistan shook the entire nation and exposed a harsh reality: nations do not survive on military power alone, but on justice, awareness, and political wisdom. The fall of Dhaka raised fundamental questions about Pakistan’s national identity, ideological direction, and state structure questions whose echoes are still felt in the country’s politics and society today.

This awakening led to significant constitutional, political, and intellectual developments. The Constitution of 1973, with its emphasis on federalism, provincial autonomy, and fundamental rights, was a direct outcome of this realization. It reflected an acknowledgment that without correcting past mistakes, a stable future could not be secured.

The fall of Dhaka also taught that a national narrative cannot be one-dimensional. A nation is composed of multiple languages, cultures, and perspectives, and genuine statecraft lies in accommodating this diversity. When regions

or communities are treated as inferior or excluded from decision-making, they begin to feel detached from the state, a sense of alienation that can eventually culminate in separation.

In today’s context, the fall of Dhaka compels us to reflect critically on whether its lessons have truly been learned. Are dissenting voices tolerated? Is resource distribution equitable? Are

smaller provinces and marginalized groups granting their rightful place? If the answers to these questions remain negative, the tragedy continues to serve as a warning rather than a resolved chapter of history.

The awakening of national consciousness demands that history be examined not through emotional rhetoric or blame-shifting but through serious and honest analysis. Reducing the fall of Dhaka to external conspiracies or accusations of treachery is an evasion of responsibility. Nations progress only when they acknowledge their failures and commit to meaningful reform.

The tragedy also reinforced the principle that democracy, constitutionalism, and public consent are the true foundations of state strength. When people are excluded from governance, the state weakens. Although Pakistan has faced numerous challenges since 1971, the fall of Dhaka marked the beginning of a renewed journey toward self-awareness, constitutional supremacy, and federal harmony.

In conclusion, the fall of Dhaka remains a painful reality, but when approached as a lesson in collective awakening, it becomes a source of invaluable wisdom. It reminds us that while power may sustain a state, only justice can build a nation. The urgent need today is not to dwell in despair but to draw lessons from this tragedy to construct a democratic, inclusive, and conscious Pakistan one where history is not allowed to repeat itself.

Mysterious snow in Minsk gets explanation from weather experts



MINSK: Anthropogenic snow has been observed in Minsk. Its origin has been explained by the National Center for Hydrometeorology, Radioactive Pollution Control, and Environmental Monitoring (Belhydromet) under the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, BelTA has learned.

Residents in some districts of the Belarusian capital could see localized winter-white landscapes in late November and December. Specialists clarified that this type of snow is of anthropogenic, or industrial, origin and may contain pollutants.

“Anthropogenic, or industrial, snow is a winter phenomenon where emissions of water vapor, typically from an industrial source, lead to localized snowfall. This local snow can be observed in cities and towns depending on the amount of excess water vapor and local meteorological conditions, provided suitable anticyclonic conditions are present and near permanent local sources of water vapor and air pollution,” Belhydromet explained.

This phenomenon is usually associated with cold, stable anticyclonic conditions. “Primarily when ground fog, trapped by an inversion layer, does not dissipate and becomes supersaturated with water vapor. Under these conditions, condensation nuclei, which are the finest suspended particles of industrial pollution like dust, soot, and ash, facilitate the formation of ice crystals and the subsequent precipitation of light snow over a limited area of several square kilometers on the leeward side,” the National Center for Hydrometeorology, Radioactive Pollution Control, and Environmental Monitoring said.

As a distinct local meteorological phenomenon, industrial snow has only been recognized in Europe in recent decades.

The project was implemented by Lok Sudhar Association, a non-governmental organization working to improve the essential eyecare services for underserved communities in Havelian. The Government of Japan, under its Grant Assistance for Grass-roots Human Security Projects (GGP) Program, had provided financial assistance of 51,407 USD which was allocated in 2024 for the construction for eyecare facility and provision of advanced ophthalmology equipment used in the diagnosis of different ophthalmic diseases and cataract surgeries. The inauguration ceremony was attended by the Japanese Embassy officials, NGO board members and local community representatives.

Lok Sudhar Association, with more than twenty five years of experience in community uplift and social sector initiatives, has worked collaboratively with various donors



to deliver impactful projects. This project funded by the Government of Japan, improved the quality of eyecare service in Havelian, especially enabled to access cataract surgery for the first time in this region.

This initiative responds to the pressing medical needs of over 350,000 people in Tehsil Havelian and adjoining areas. After the completion of the project, almost 30,000 patients have undergone treatment and 1,260 cataract surgeries were

operated in this facility in one year. This facility significantly reduces the financial and physical burden on elderly and vulnerable patients who often faced delays in receiving timely medical care.

E. Mr. Akamatsu Shuichi, while speaking at the ceremony, congratulated Lok Sudhar Association on the successful completion of the project. Ambassador Akamatsu emphasized that provision of affordable health facility is the one of the top priorities



in Japan's assistance policy toward Pakistan. Ambassador Akamatsu also highlighted that the access to quality treatment is the basic prerequisite for any nation to achieve social prosperity. Ambassador Akamatsu stressed that Government of Japan would continue to support the people of Pakistan, to improve their living standards and represented his sincere wish that this project would certainly strengthen the longstanding friendship between the people of Japan and Pakistan.

Al-Shifa surgeons restore vision of 101-year-old patient

RAWALPINDI: Al-Shifa Trust surgeons have successfully restored vision to a 101-year-old patient suffering from dense cataracts and age-related macular degeneration (AMD), after multiple specialists had declined the case, citing high medical risks.

Raza Khan, a resident of Islamabad, underwent the high-risk procedure at Al-Shifa Trust Eye Hospital in Rawalpindi. The surgical team, led by Dr. Sabehuddin, used advanced surgical tools and special gels to protect the delicate eye tissues, which is especially important in elderly patients.

The case carried sentimental weight for the institution, as Mr. Khan was a close friend of the late Lieutenant General Jahan Dad Khan, the trust's



founder. Prior to his procedure Khan's family reported being turned away by several ophthalmologists in the twin cities, who felt the patient's age and retinal degeneration posed too great a risk.

“The procedure involved more than just removing the cloudy lens,” noted the head of the cataract department. “We had to work with retinal problems that usually reduce the chances of success for very elderly patients. To

witness recovery at this age shows the progress of modern eye care.”

Post-operative assessments confirmed a significant breakthrough as the patient has regained sufficient vision to identify family members and navigate his surroundings independently. His recovery marks one of the oldest successful cataract interventions documented in the region.

Al-Shifa Trust currently operates six specialized hospitals across Pakistan, including facilities in Rawalpindi, Chakwal, Kohat, Sukkur, Muzaffarabad, and Gilgit. A seventh hospital is currently under construction in Lahore and is scheduled to begin operations in 2027. According to institutional data, approximately 80 percent of the trust's patients receive treatment free of charge or at

heavily subsidized rates.

The success comes at a critical time for eye health in Pakistan. National Survey data indicate there are roughly 2.7 million blind individuals in the country, with cataracts accounting for 51 percent of those cases. Despite the high prevalence, surgical coverage remains below 65 percent in rural districts, often leaving the elderly in total darkness.

This milestone shines as a testament to the extraordinary growth of complex geriatric interventions within Pakistan's philanthropic healthcare sector. Fueled by the community's generosity, Al-Shifa Trust proudly bridges the gap left by the overstrained public health system, transforming lives through medical excellence.

KSrelief Concludes 20 Free Eye Treatment Camps Across Pakistan under Noor Saudi Volunteer Initiative 2025

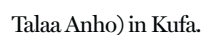

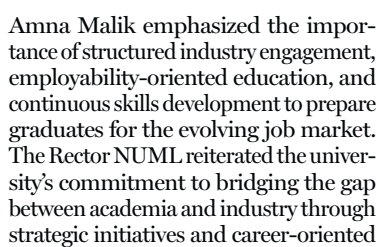

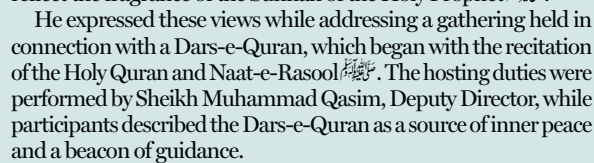

Islamabad court orders Rs5.41 billion compensation for Airblue Flight 202 victims

ISLAMABAD: A district and sessions court in Islamabad on Tuesday ordered compensation for the families of victims of the Airblue Flight 202 crash of July 28, 2010, delivering a key verdict after years of prolonged legal proceedings.

The court dismissed all eight appeals filed by the private airline and ordered Airblue to pay compensation amounting to Rs5.41 billion.

It also imposed a fine of Rs100,000 on the airline for wasting judicial time and filing frivolous petitions.

The written verdict was issued by Additional District and Sessions Judge Rasool Bakhsh.

The victims’ families had initially challenged the decision of a civil judge, with the case later taken up by the high court.

The high court subsequently referred the matter back to the



jurisdiction of the sessions court for adjudication.

According to investigations by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA), the crash fell under the category of Controlled Flight

into Terrain (CFIT).

The probe concluded that the flight crew violated safety procedures during landing in poor weather conditions and brought the aircraft to an unsafe

low altitude.

Airblue Flight 202 was a domestic passenger service from Karachi to Islamabad.

The aircraft crashed into the Margalla Hills while attempting

to land at Benazir Bhutto International Airport, killing 146 passengers and six crew members. The crash remains the deadliest air disaster in the country’s history.

NAB Chairman Distributes Rs. 186 Million Among Affectees in Suzuki Sialkot Motors Case

LAHORE: Chairman, National Accountability Bureau (NAB), Lt. Gen. (R) Nazir Ahmed, visited NAB Lahore and presided over a special cheque distribution ceremony for affectees of the Suzuki Sialkot Motors case, involving cheating of the public at large. During the ceremony, an amount of Rs. 186.188 million was distributed among 136 claimants under the supervision of Mirza Faran Baig DG NAB Lahore.

The recovered amount was obtained through the plea bargain mechanism, reflecting NAB’s effective accounta-

bility framework for recovery of looted public money. At present, 50 percent of the recovered amount has been distributed among the verified claimants, while the remaining 50 percent will be disbursed shortly, following completion of procedural formalities.

While addressing the ceremony, the worthy Chairman NAB reiterated NAB’s firm commitment to ensuring swift recovery and transparent disbursement of funds to victims of financial crimes. He directed the concerned officers to expedite the remaining recovery and disbursement process in all cases pertaining to cheating of the public at large, so that

justice may be delivered without delay.

DPM Dar directs implementation of govt policies for GSP Plus continuation

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Senator Mohammad Ishaq Dar on Tuesday directed all the ministries and departments concerned to implement the government policies in letter and spirit for the continuation of GSP Plus status.

Maryam says ownership law was meant to protect citizens

LAHORE: Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz has reacted after the Lahore High Court (LHC) ordered a suspension of the Punjab Protection of Ownership Ordinance 2025, halting its implementation until further hearings.

The order was issued by Chief Justice of the Lahore High Court, Justice Aalia Neelum, while hearing petitions filed by Abida Parveen and other applicants.

After addressing preliminary objections, the court recommended the formation of a full bench to hear the matter.

During Monday’s hearing, the Punjab Chief Secretary appeared before the court.

The chief justice strongly criticised the provincial government, remarking that if the law were allowed to continue, even Jati Umra (residence of the Sharif family) could be vacated within half an hour. Justice Neelum observed that the



ordinance ignored citizens’ fundamental rights and undermined judicial authority, questioning how a revenue officer could order possession in cases already pending before civil courts.

She also asked what purpose the law was meant to serve.

Responding to the court’s order, Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz said the ordinance had been enacted to help millions of Punjab residents who had suffered for decades, and that its suspension would benefit the land grabbers and qabza mafia.

She said the Punjab Assembly had passed the law to rid the public of land mafias, warning that people would view the suspension as backing for encroachers.
