Earlier, upon his arrival at Lahore Garrison, the COAS & CDF was received by Commander Lahore Corps.

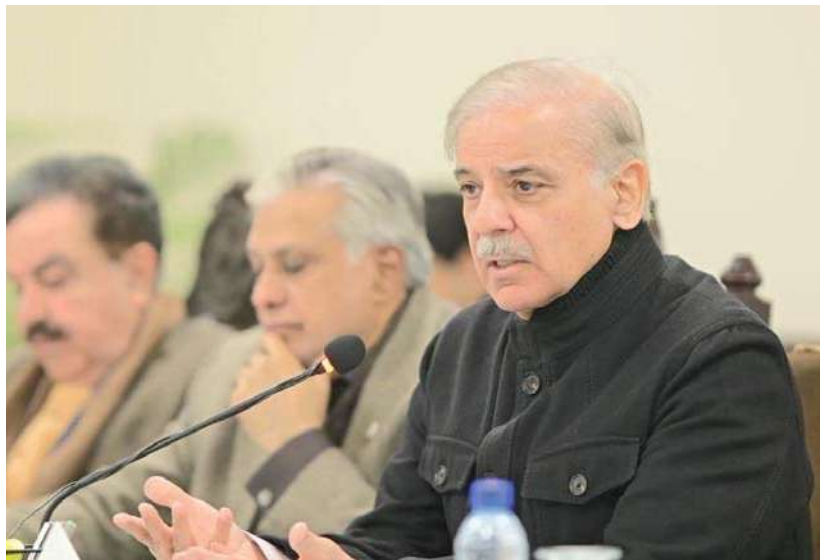
PM Shehbaz launches major infrastructure, education initiatives for Balochistan's uplift

QUETTA: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Thursday reiterated the federal government's firm resolve to ensure accelerated development of Balochistan, saying that Pakistan must pool its national resources without hesitation to bring the province at par with other parts of the country.

Addressing a ceremony to inaugurate and launch key development projects, the prime minister said the initiatives had a direct and lasting link with Balochistan's progress. He described Balochistan as a historic province that voluntarily acceded to Pakistan, reflecting the aspirations of its political leadership and people.

"Balochistan is the largest province by land and the



smallest by population, yet education, health and electricity are the basic rights of every Baloch," Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said, adding that a strong federation could

only be built by ensuring balanced development of all federating units.

The prime minister laid the foundation stone of the N-25 Pakistan Expressway,

calling it a practical manifestation of the government's commitment to the people of Balochistan. He directed the National Highway Authority (NHA) and the

Frontier Works Organisation (FWO) to complete the project within one year, acknowledging the challenge but expressing confidence in timely delivery. He said many precious lives had been lost on the existing route, and completion of the expressway would significantly improve safety and connectivity.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said terrorism in Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa was being fuelled by a neighbouring country through financial and material support.

He paid tribute to the sacrifices of armed forces personnel, law enforcement agencies and civilians, and vowed that terrorism would be eliminated from the two provinces as it was in 2018.

Aurangzeb meets Visa CEMEA leadership to advance digital payments, financial inclusion agenda

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Finance and Revenue Senator Muhammad Aurangzeb on Thursday held a meeting with Visa delegation led by Tareq Muhmood, Regional President for Central Europe, Middle East and Africa (CEMEA) and discussed advancing digital payments, financial inclusion, and ongoing economic reforms.

The minister welcomed the delegation and appreciated Visa's continued engagement with Pakistan's financial sector. The discussion focused on Pakistan's improving macroeconomic indicators, ongoing stabilization efforts, and the government's priorities for achieving sustainable and inclusive economic growth, said a news release.

Aurangzeb briefed the delegation on progress made under the International Monetary Fund (IMF)-supported program,



external validation from international credit rating agencies, and the government's reform agenda covering taxation, energy, state-owned enterprises, public debt management, and privatization, including recent steps taken to accelerate the privatization process.

Both sides exchanged views on the acceleration of Pakistan's

digital transformation, with particular emphasis on digital infrastructure, payment systems, and the digitization of government payments, it added.

Aurangzeb highlighted that digitalization is being led at the highest level by the Prime Minister to ensure coordinated, cross-government implementation.

Sindh, Centre agree on major railway revamp in province

KARACHI: Sindh Chief Minister Murad Ali Shah and Federal Minister for Railways Hanif Abbasi on Thursday agreed to launch major railway projects in the province, aimed at modernising infrastructure, improving safety and expanding affordable travel.

The meeting decided to modernise Sindh's 858-kilometre railway network, upgrade Rohri railway station to international standards, secure unmanned level crossings and restore six major rail routes across the province.

A 25-year framework agreement between Pakistan Railways and the Sindh government was also approved. The two sides reviewed railway infrastructure rehabilitation projects estimated to cost Rs63.26 billion.

CM Shah approved Rs6.6 billion in provincial funding for railway development schemes.

Railways Minister Abbasi said Rs1 billion would be allocated for the upgradation of Rohri station, which will be completed within six months. The station will also be equipped with six new escalators and a solar-powered water filtration plant.

KARACHI: Member of the Azad Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly and former Minister for Information, Maulana Pir Muhammad Mazhar Saeed Shah, has strongly condemned the Indian government's move to give preference to the Lieutenant Governor over locally elected representatives.

In a statement, he said that this decision reflects a deliberate attempt to sabotage peace in Indian-occupied Jammu and Kashmir. He added that the elected representatives of Jammu and Kashmir have already been reduced to mere rubber stamps, and the latest transfer of powers will further deprive the Kashmiri people of their fundamental rights.

Maulana Pir Muhammad Mazhar Saeed Shah stated that this step is not only a blatant violation of democratic norms but also another clear example of India's oppression and repression. He urged the international community to take serious notice of the ongoing human rights violations and injustices being inflicted upon the Kashmiri people in occupied Kashmir.

The former Information Minister emphasized that the people of Kashmir will continue their struggle for their legitimate and fundamental rights, and that such tactics cannot weaken their resolve.

Murad, Hanif agree to launch transformative rail partnership in Sindh

KARACHI: Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah and Federal Minister for Railways Hanif Abbasi, in their decisive meeting, agreed on a multi-billion-rupee plan to modernise the provincial railway network – starting from Karachi to Kashmore and Karachi to Tharparkar – to provide state-of-the-art transportation to millions.

“We are ready to invest Rs 6.6 billion to replace 100 out of the 308 manned railway crossings across the province, rehabilitate the railway system, and launch six trains from its resources in the first phase and another six in the next phase,” the chief minister committed. ATTOCK: The District Education Authority Attock has taken serious notice of a violation of the Government of Punjab's orders regarding winter vacations and has recommended strict action against a school operating under the Punjab Education Foundation (PEF).

Dera Ismail Khan Police Issue Annual Performance Report 2025

DERA ISMAIL KHAN: The District Police Dera Ismail Khan have issued their Annual Performance Report for the year 2025.

According to details, under the vision of Inspector General of Police Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Zulfiqar Hameed and on the directives of Regional Police Officer Dera Syed Ashfaq Anwar, the Dera Ismail Khan Police, under the supervision of District Police Officer Sajjad Ahmed Sahibzada, achieved significant successes against crime during the year 2025.

The police conducted indiscriminate operations against various crimes including theft, dacoity, robbery and burglary. A total of 441 cases were worked out and 642 accused were arrested. Venezuela’s people must be heard, insists UN human rights chief

Responding to the seizure of Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro by the United States, UN human rights chief Volker Türk has reiterated deep concerns that the military operation undermined fundamental protections for sovereign countries.

The US action made “all States less safe around the world”, said Ravina Shamdasani, spokesperson for the High Commissioner.

Speaking to journalists in Geneva, Ms. Shamdasani rejected the US justification for its intervention on the grounds of the Venezuelan Government’s “longstanding and appalling” human rights record.

“Accountability for human rights violations cannot be achieved by unilateral military intervention in violation of international law,” she insisted.

“Far from being a victory for human rights, this military intervention, which is in contravention of Venezuelan sovereignty and the UN Charter, damages the architecture of international security...And this is a point that the Secretary-General has also made.”

Ms Shamdasani explained the High Commissioner’s position that the military operation “violates the fundamental principle of international law (and) the UN Charter, which states that States must not threaten or use force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any State”.

The UN human rights office, OHCHR, was expelled from Venezuela in February 2024, following its consistent reporting on the deteriorating situation there. Independent probes commissioned by the Human Rights Council have also detailed grave and ongoing abuses against opponents of the country’s ruling party.

A state of emergency was declared on Saturday that restricts the free movement of people, the seizure of property necessary for national defence and the suspension of the right to assembly and to protest, Ms. Shamdasani noted. “We’re particularly concerned, given the record that the Government has in suppressing free speech, protest, freedom of assembly, using the pretext of national security.”

“The High Commissioner calls on the US and the Venezuelan authorities, as well as the international community, to ensure full respect for international law, including human rights,” she said, adding that the future of Venezuela “must be determined by the Venezuelan people alone, with full respect for their human rights, including the right to self-determination, and sovereignty over their lives and their resources”.

Beyond the political crisis in Venezuela, almost eight million people, or one in four people, need humanitarian assistance today, after years of economic decline, repression and instability.

The UN aid coordination office, OCHA, said that a response plan remains in place requiring approximately \$600 million.

What Venezuela’s Latest Incident Teaches About Strong Defense and Federation

Across the developing world, Venezuela is widely seen not as an isolated crisis but as a revealing example of how global power politics operate and how vulnerable states without sufficient national strength can become. Observers in Africa and Asia interpret its experience as part of a recurring pattern in which powerful actors employ sanctions, diplomatic pressure, propaganda, covert measures, and military threats to bend weaker states to their will. This interpretation resonates strongly in Pakistan, where historical experiences of conflict and external pressure have fostered the belief that moral arguments, resource wealth, or popular leadership alone offer little protection in an international system driven by interests and power. As a result, Venezuela’s predicament is absorbed as a cautionary tale rather than distant news.

Pakistan’s own history reinforces this outlook, shaping a conviction that survival depends on demonstrable strength, particularly robust defense capabilities and credible deterrence. The development of its armed forces and the acquisition of nuclear deterrence are viewed as existential necessities that safeguarded sovereignty in a hostile regional environment. In contrast, Venezuela’s trajectory is seen as a warning: despite vast oil wealth and assertive leadership, internal polarization, economic collapse, and weakened institutions eroded national cohesion and defense capacity, leaving the state vulnerable to external pressure and intervention. For many in Pakistan and the wider developing world, the central lesson is that internal fragmentation and perceived weakness invite foreign interference, while unity and credible strength remain the most reliable shields for national inde-

pendence.

This chain of reasoning culminates in the assertive conviction that a strong army is not a luxury, an anachronism, or a symbol of undesirable militarism, but an absolute necessity for survival within an unforgiving and anarchic international system. Economic development, social progress, and democratic stability are all universally acknowledged as vital and desirable national goals, but they are simultaneously regarded as fragile prize—if the nation-state cannot physically defend its borders, deter military aggression, or resist multifarious forms of external coercion. Venezuela’s vast but ultimately unsecured oil wealth is routinely cited as definitive proof that natural resources and economic potential alone are hollow guarantees of true security or meaningful independence.

The argument derived from this geopolitical realism is further extended to inform internal debates within Pakistan, including those pertaining to regions like Azad Jammu and Kashmir. When voices advocating for separation or complete independence from Pakistan are raised, proponents of national unity often employ Venezuela’s experience as a potent cautionary tale. Their contention is that small, fledgling, or newly formed states located in perpetually hostile neighborhoods face immense, often

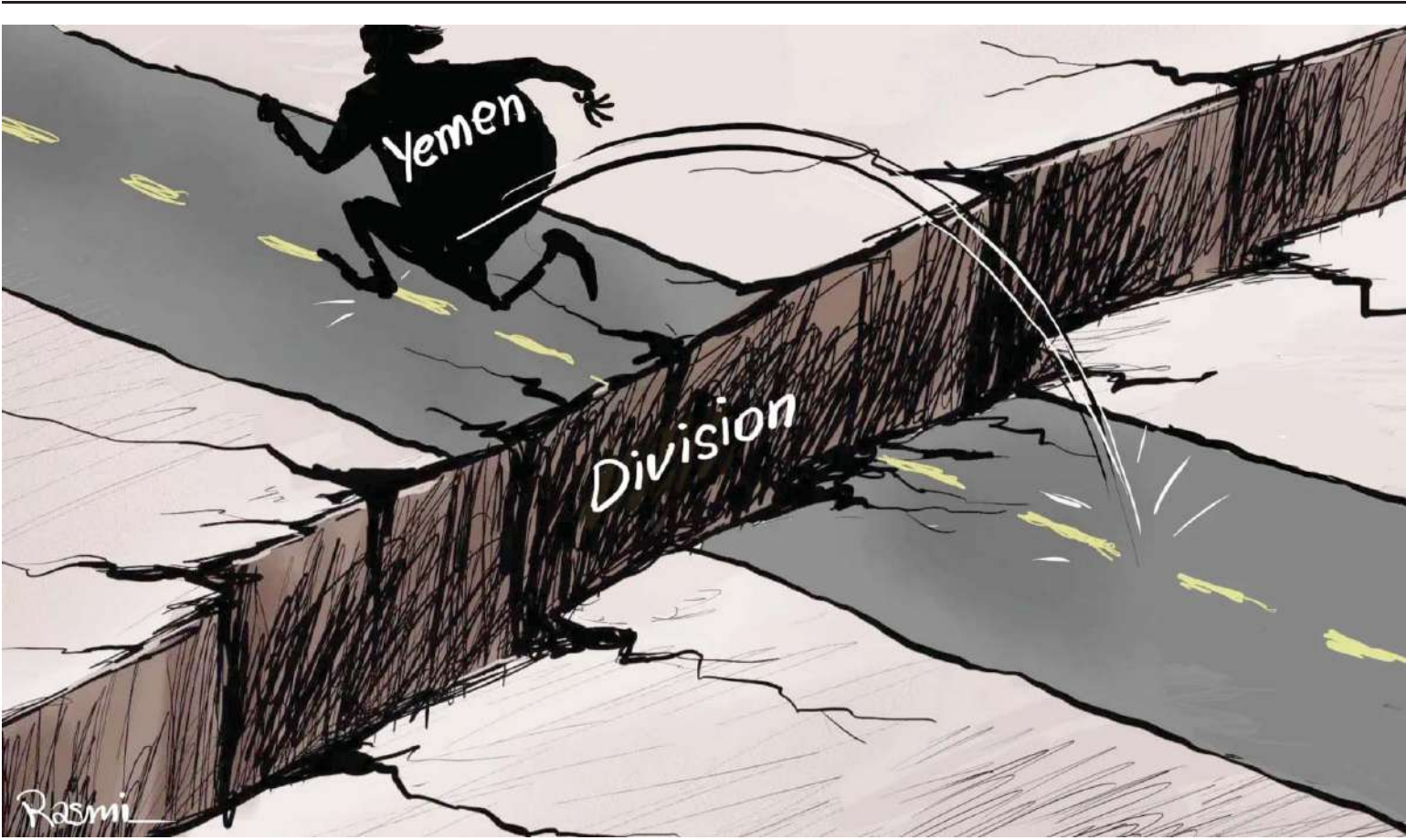
insurmountable, challenges in maintaining genuine sovereignty and security autonomy. In a world order still fundamentally driven by raw power politics, fragmented regions lacking in comprehensive national strength—particularly in defensive capacity—may swiftly become easy targets for external manipulation, becoming pawns in larger geopolitical games rather than masters of their own destiny. Therefore, the argument follows that unity with Pakistan, despite

all its well-documented internal challenges and governance complexities, offers infinitely greater collective security, strategic depth, and diplomatic heft than would a precarious and isolated existence in an uncertain and often predatory global environment.

Recent regional crises and military confrontations, often referred to within Pakistan’s strategic discourse as defining moments of national testing, are consistently invoked to reinforce this foundational belief. The prevailing view is that Pakistan’s demonstrated ability to stand firm during such acute crises, to maintain its dignity and agency on the world stage, and to avoid catastrophic outcomes is directly and causally linked to its relentless military preparedness and the sobering shadow of its nuclear deterrence. According to this entrenched narrative, any visible hesitation, public discord within the security apparatus, or perceived weakness in national resolve would inevitably invite the same kind of treatment that other vulnerable countries have endured, potentially transforming Pakistan from a respected actor into yet

another cautionary example in the annals of post-colonial realpolitik.

Thus, the central message distilled from Venezuela’s recent ordeal is not primarily framed within Pakistan as a moral or legal judgment on the specific rights and wrongs of actions taken by various international actors towards Caracas. Rather, it is internalized as a stark, unambiguous, and sobering reminder of the enduring realities of international power. Survival in today’s world, it is concluded, depends on a synergistic combination of internal unity, strong and resilient state institutions, credible and modern defense capabilities, and unwavering national resolve. For Pakistan, translating this lesson into practice is seen to necessitate a continuous commitment to strengthening its armed forces through sustained investment in modern equipment, rigorous training, and doctrinal innovation; to maintaining the credibility and security of its nuclear deterrent; and to fostering a durable sense of unity and purpose among its diverse populace. It also implies a conscious national effort to reject and counter what are perceived as agendas—whether born of external inspiration or internal division—that seek to weaken the state from within through sectarian or ethnic polarization, political extremism, or the persistent cultivation of hostility toward the country’s core national institutions. In this comprehensively held worldview, a strong, united, and cohesive Pakistan, underpinned by a capable, professional, and respected military, is therefore not merely a source of national pride or a ceremonial artifact of statehood. It is, instead, the very bedrock, the non-negotiable foundation, upon which the nation’s continued independence, its sovereign prerogatives, and its hard-won dignity ultimately and irrevocably rest.

How the Pandemic Redefined International Threats Beyond Health

The COVID-19 pandemic has fundamentally transformed the global understanding of security. Traditionally, international security was defined through military strength, power politics, and inter-state conflicts. However, the pandemic revealed how non-military threats such as disease, economic instability, misinformation, and social disruption can equally endanger the survival of nations and individuals. Drawing from the post-Cold War broadening of the security concept discussed by Heurlin and Kristensen (2002), this article explores how COVID-19 redefined global threats, exposed institutional weaknesses, and reshaped the idea of interdependence and human security within the international system. It argues that the pandemic established health as a core dimension of international security, emphasizing the need for cooperative, multidimensional approaches to global stability.

Beyond economics and politics, the pandemic generated a profound human security crisis. School closures disrupted education for over 1.6 billion learners (UNESCO, 2021), while millions faced unemployment and social isolation. Rates of domestic violence, depression, and anxiety rose sharply, demonstrating that insecurity is also psychological and social. These challenges reflect what Heurlin and Kristensen (2002) term the “individual as victim,” where threats endanger not only physical health but also identity, dignity, and societal coherence. The pandemic widened global inequalities, with marginalized populations—migrant workers, refugees, and women—bearing the heaviest burdens. It highlighted the interconnection between public health and

human rights, emphasizing that international security must include human well-being and equality to ensure sustainable peace.

COVID-19 accelerated digital transformation but also exposed new vulnerabilities. As governments, corporations, and schools shifted online, cyberattacks on health and research institutions increased dramatically. The World Health Organization reported a fivefold rise in cyberattacks in 2020. Simultaneously, misinformation and conspiracy theories spread through social media, creating what the WHO labeled an “infodemic.” This information disorder became a global threat, undermining trust in governments and vaccines. Heurlin and Kristensen’s (2002) notion of “new technology security” anticipated such challenges, warning that advanced technology can become both a safeguard and a source of insecurity. COVID-19 validated this prediction, as digital platforms became critical battlegrounds for influence, control, and misinformation.

The pandemic’s impact in South Asia further demonstrates how health crises intersect with fragile governance and regional insecurity. In Pakistan and Afghanistan, weak healthcare infrastructure, economic dependency, and political instability magnified the crisis. Border closures disrupted trade and refugee movement, while misinformation limited vaccination efforts. Health workers were frequently targeted, linking public health insecurity with broader threats of violence and governance failure. These cases represent what Heurlin and Kristensen (2002) call societal and regional security, where instability within one state endangers neighboring regions and contributes to international insecurity.

The pandemic reinforced the principle of global interdependence. Heurlin and Kris-

tensen (2002) describe the modern world as “one world or none,” meaning that isolationism and nationalism themselves can be threats to global survival. COVID-19 made this statement more relevant than ever. No state could contain the virus alone; global health required shared information, coordinated policies, and equitable vaccine distribution. Initiatives such as COVAX and international health diplomacy represented steps toward collective security, yet vaccine nationalism and inequality undermined their success. The crisis highlighted that in a deeply interconnected system, the insecurity of one region can rapidly endanger the entire world. Global peace and prosperity thus depend on strengthening international institutions, fostering transparency, and embedding health resilience into the broader architecture of security.

COVID-19 redefined international security by demonstrating that the gravest threats to human survival may emerge not from conflict but from within societies themselves. It blurred distinctions between health, economy, technology, and politics, proving that insecurity is multidimensional and globally shared. As Heurlin and Kristensen (2002) argue, the sustainability of the world depends on cooperative norms and collective awareness—the realization that true security cannot exist in isolation. The pandemic has therefore transformed the discourse of international relations, emphasizing human and global security as central to future stability. It challenges policymakers to integrate health preparedness, digital safety, and social resilience into national and international strategies. The ultimate lesson of COVID-19 is clear: in an interconnected world, the security of one nation depends on the security of all.

However, the cases in Syria and Ukraine remind us about the fact that the UN is often simply not able to do anything due to the structure of this institution, in particular, the veto system. These hues and shades of both success and failure make the UN a symbol of both hope and limitation.

To conclude, the United Nations is a role that is significant yet has flaws in ensuring world peace. It has assisted in the destruction of wars, peace processes, and it has offered a platform through which dialogue can be held among countries. Meanwhile, its shortcomings have enabled protracted battles to persist and innocent people to perish. My conclusion on this is that the UN is needed though it should be reformed, more united among major nations, and less politicking about. It can only do that at that time as the protector of world peace. Nevertheless, I do not think that the problems that the UN has been facing justify the disregard of its work, still, it is one of the very few organizations that can show the world the way to cooperate, but not compete, and that is why its activity still has a lot of deep meaning.

China-US Reset Dominates Discussion at CASS Lahore Security Forum

LAHORE: The Centre for Aerospace and Security Studies (CASS) Lahore organised a guest lecture titled "Evolving Global Order: China-US Reset" on 7 January 2026. As an independent think tank, CASS Lahore organises academic events for scholars and practitioners interested in national security in its wider context. The event was attended by academics, intellectuals, and domain experts.

Dr Ahsan Abbas, Director, CASS Lahore, delivered the opening address, noting that the evolving global order requires a renewed approach to balance competition and cooperation between major powers to ensure international stability.

Mr Shahid Javed Burki, an eminent economist and former finance minister, stated that the global order is undergoing a fundamental transformation as China's rapid economic growth positions it to challenge the US, reflecting a significant realign-



ment of global power. He highlighted China's successful state-led development model and robust investment in technology in contrast to the market-driven approach and coercive power utilised by the United States to protect its strategic dominance. Furthermore, he noted that Pakistan occupies a critical role in China's strategic calculus and underscored the importance of maintaining a stable and confident partnership while resisting external pressures and media propaganda that could undermine long-term economic cooperation.

In his concluding remarks, Air

Marshal Asim Suleiman (Retd), President, CASS, Lahore, highlighted that the China-US relationship is the decisive factor reshaping the strategic, economic, and institutional contours of the twenty-first century. He observed that while strategic rivalry is structural and enduring, cooperation in areas of shared interest remains a practical necessity for global stability. He further noted that technology competition has emerged as a central fault line, requiring a balance between legitimate security concerns and the benefits of economic efficiency to avoid fragmenting the global economy.

The event concluded with a lively interactive session. The discussion explored Pakistan's balancing policy between China and the United States, the prospects of CPEC 2.0, and the strategic positioning of regional actors amidst great power competition. The participants appreciated CASS Lahore's initiative in hosting an engaging and thought-provoking discussion.

Israeli forces kill four in Gaza, say they hit rocket launch site

Hamas claims over 1,100 Israeli ceasefire violations since October; Israel demands handover of final body under truce

Israeli forces killed at least four Palestinians in two separate strikes in the Gaza Strip on Thursday, hours after the military said it had hit the site of a failed militant rocket launch, the latest violence to jeopardise the ceasefire.

Medics said an Israeli airstrike killed at least three people and wounded three others, including children, in a tent in the western area of Khan Younis in the

southern Gaza Strip. Another strike killed a person east of the city, near where Israeli forces operate.

There was no immediate Israeli comment on the death reports.

Earlier, the military said it had struck a launch site shortly after the firing of a rocket that had failed to reach Israeli territory. It accused Hamas of violating the ceasefire twice in the past 24 hours. A source from the Palestinian militant group told Reuters it was checking the allegation.

A ceasefire agreed in October has not progressed beyond the first phase, under which major fighting stopped, Israel withdrew from less than half of Gaza

and Hamas fighters released live hostages, and human remains in return for detained Palestinians.

Under future phases yet to be hammered out, U. S. President Donald Trump's plan envisages Hamas disarming, Israel pulling out further and an internationally backed administration rebuilding Gaza. But little progress has been made on the next steps. More than 400 Palestinians and three Israeli soldiers have been killed since the ceasefire took effect, and nearly all of Gaza's more than two million people now live in makeshift homes or damaged buildings in a sliver of territory where Israeli troops have withdrawn, and Hamas has reasserted control.



Israel is awaiting the handover of the final body under the initial stage of the truce. An Israeli official close to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has said Israel would

not move to the next phase of the ceasefire until Hamas returns the remains of the last Israeli hostage still held in Gaza.

Israel has yet to open the Rafah

crossing between Gaza and Egypt, another condition of the U. S.-backed plan, saying it will do so only once the remains are returned.

Ceasefire Looking Fragile


Israel and Hamas have accused each other of major breaches of the ceasefire deal and remain far apart on the more difficult steps envisaged for the next phase.

Israel has continued to carry out air strikes and targeted operations across Gaza. The Israeli military said it views "with utmost severity" any attempts by militant groups in Gaza to attack Israel.

A Hamas official told Reuters on Thursday the group had documented more than 1,100 Israeli

violations of the ceasefire since October and had urged mediators to intervene. The violations include killings, injuries, artillery and aerial strikes, home demolitions and detention of people, he said. Hamas has refused to disarm and has been reasserting its control. Israel has said it will resume military action if Hamas is not disarmed peacefully.

Hamas-led fighters killed some 1,200 people and abducted 251 others in an assault on Israel on October 7, 2023, according to Israeli figures. More than 71,000 Palestinians have been killed in Israel's offensive in Gaza since then, according to the territory's health ministry.

ISLAMABAD: TikTok's Search feature has become a powerful discovery tool, where millions increasingly come to the platform to explore new ideas, learn practical skills, find inspiration, and engage with content that reflects their culture, language, and everyday lives. People are now turning to TikTok as a video-first search engine, especially when they want answers explained visually and quickly. They come to the platform to search for short videos that show, explain, and contextualise information in real time — from how to prepare for an exam or plan a trip, to understanding breaking news or learning a new skill. This shift reflects a broader preference for authentic, creator-led video explanations that feel relatable, practical, and easier to understand.

In Pakistan, TikTok has evolved far beyond just an entertainment platform. With TikTok's Search feature, it has become a dynamic, visual discovery experience built around curiosity and real-life utility. In the past year, the region saw significant increases in searches related to education, culture, food, travel, beauty, lifestyle, news explainers, and every day "how-to" moments, demonstrating how people now turn to TikTok to learn, understand, and connect.

Insights reveal that the TikTok community in Pakistan is searching for answers to real-world questions at an unprecedented rate. Searches for several popular content hashtags rose in Pakistan over the past year, pointing to growing use of the platform as a discovery tool. Searches linked to #TravelTik increased by 53%, while #FoodTik rose by 52%. #StudyTik searches were up 60%, and #FitnessTik recorded the largest jump, growing 66% year-on-year. The figures suggest Pakistani users are increasingly turning to TikTok to find content aligned with their interests and curiosity.

Speaking at the session, Dr. Najeeb Memon, Director General, Tax Policy Office, appreciated the quality of engagement with OICCI members and assured participants



that stakeholder input remains central to effective tax policymaking.

Yousaf Hussain, President OICCI, said that the real value of the proposed tax policy reforms lies in how these are translated into improved predictability, consistency, and meaningful engagement with

stakeholders.

"Businesses plan over long horizons, and frequent changes, unclear interpretations, and retrospective measures undermine confidence and raise the cost of capital. A consultative, well-signalled, medium-term tax policy framework focused on broadening the tax base, simplifying compliance, and aligning taxation with national priorities such as investment, exports, and job creation would significantly improve investor sentiment and support sustainable economic growth," he said.

M. Abdul Aleem, OICCI Secretary General, emphasized the importance of tax reforms to sustain investor confidence. "Foreign investors are increasingly looking beyond short-term stabilization towards structural reforms.

The session concluded with both sides agreeing to maintain regular engagement to ensure that investor perspectives continue to help facilitate tax policy discussions, with the shared objective of improving predictability, consistency, and investor confidence in Pakistan's tax framework.

SECP Revamps Research Analyst Regulations to Enhance Investor Confidence and Transparency

ISLAMABAD: The Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) has notified amendments to the Research Analyst Regulations, 2015 (Regulations), reaffirming its commitment to strengthening governance practices and upholding market integrity. The amended regulatory framework is expected to enable investors to make informed investment decisions, increase transparency, and enhance investor confidence in the capital market.

These amendments mark a significant improvement from the earlier framework, establishing a robust and systematic process for regulating research analysts.

The previous Regulations were limited to providing a guiding framework and did not prescribe any mechanism for registration. The amendments now mandate SECP registration for research analysts.

These amendments have been finalized after extensive consultations with key stakeholders, including research analysts, brokerage houses, asset managers, and industry associations. The SECP published a consultation paper to solicit feedback, held multiple consultation sessions, and subsequently issued draft amendments for public comment. In response to market feedback, several key reforms were incorporated to enhance clarity and effectiveness.

PSL expands to eight teams as Hyderabad, Sialkot fetch Rs3.6bn

LAHORE: FKS Group bought the seventh franchise for Rs1.75 billion and finalised the name Hyderabad.

The Pakistan Super League (PSL) on Thursday expanded to eight teams after two new franchises, Hyderabad and Sialkot, were sold at auction for a combined Rs3.6 billion.

The auction was held at the Jinnah Convention Centre in Islamabad and was attended by Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) Chairman Mohsin Naqvi, federal ministers, senior officials and players.

Proceedings began with the introduction of 10 bidders and six short-listed cities.

PCB Chairman Mohsin Naqvi formally opened the auction by ringing the bell, while former Pakistan captain Wasim Akram served as the auctioneer.

Bidding for the seventh PSL team opened at Rs1.1 billion and saw a competitive contest between FKS Group and I2C Group.

FKS Group secured the franchise with a winning bid of Rs1.75 billion

and selected Hyderabad as the team's home city.

In the second and final round, bidding for the eighth team began at Rs1.7 billion.

OZ Developers emerged as the highest bidder, acquiring the most expensive franchise for Rs1.85 billion and naming the team Sialkot.

With the addition of Hyderabad and Sialkot, the number of PSL teams has increased from six to eight, marking a significant milestone in the league's growth.

Addressing the ceremony, Mohsin Naqvi congratulated the successful bidders and praised the efforts of the PCB and PSL management in strengthening the league.

The event also featured prize distribution for national teams.

The Pakistan Shaheens and the Hong Kong Sixes team were honoured for recent tournament successes.

The PCB awarded Rs90 million to the Rising Stars Asia Cup-winning team, while the Hong Kong Sixes champions received Rs1.85 million in prize money.

The 11th edition of the PSL will be held from March 26 to May 3, 2026, featuring all eight teams in action: Karachi Kings, Peshawar Zalmi, Lahore Qalandars, Islamabad United, Quetta Gladiators, Multan Sultans, Hyderabad, and Sialkot.

New teams to generate Rs36bn in next 10 years

Chairman PCB Mohsin Naqvi said the auction was successfully completed and projected that the new teams will generate Rs36 billion in revenue over the next 10 years.

He added that four to five US-based companies participated in the bidding, and commended Pakistani-origin bidders living overseas for their love of cricket.

US Ambassador to Pakistan, Natalie Baker, congratulated the successful bidders and noted the growing interest of American business in Pakistan cricket.

"Both countries' relations are strengthening through such initiatives," she said.

Hyderabad franchise owner Fawad Sarwar described the acquisition as a



lifelong dream come true, saying, "We love cricket and will contribute to its growth and improvement."

Sialkot owner Hamza Majeed said, "Cricket is in our blood. Overseas Pakistanis stand with Pakistan. After

airports and airlines, now a cricket team is here. Our target is to win the 11th edition of PSL."

PM Sharif said no society could progress without investing in knowledge. He announced the launch of five Daanish Schools in Dera Bugti, Sibi, Zhob, Killa Saifullah and Sohbatpur, and further announced two additional Daanish Schools in Chagai and Washuk to address the urgent needs of southern Balochistan.

He said Daanish Schools were producing doctors, engineers and globally competitive students from underprivileged backgrounds.

He also referred to the Kachhi Canal project, describing it as vital for agricultural development in Balochistan. He said the project required Rs40 billion immediately and that a final decision would be taken within the next four weeks after consultations in Islamabad.

The prime minister highlighted youth empowerment initiatives, including the laptop scheme under which 100,000

laptops were distributed on merit, with Balochistan receiving a higher share in proportion to its population. He also spoke about post-2022 flood rehabilitation, stating that significant financial assistance had been mobilised for Balochistan, including housing reconstruction and cash support to affected families.

Earlier, Minister for Communications Abdul Aleem Khan, in his welcome remarks, said it was a historic day for the National Highway Authority, noting that around 40 per cent of the NHA road network lay in Balochistan, making it the "heart of the country" in terms of connectivity.

He thanked the prime minister for his special attention to infrastructure projects in the province, particularly the Pakistan Expressway from Quetta to Chaman, and said special funds had been diverted from the petroleum levy to accelerate development in Balochistan. He added that NHA was currently working on 16 projects worth

Former world heavyweight champion Anthony Joshua paid a moving tribute on Thursday to the two close friends killed in a car crash in Nigeria, labelling them "brothers" and "great men".

The Hyderabad franchise was secured by the FKS Group, owned by Fawad Sarwar, after a successful bid of Rs 1.75 billion.

Later, OZ Developers, owned by Hamza Majeed, clinched the Sialkot franchise with a record-breaking bid of Rs1.85 billion, the highest figure of the auction.

As per PSL auction rules, successful bidders were given the option to choose their home cities from a PCB-approved list that included Faisalabad, Rawalpindi, Hyderabad, Sialkot, Muzaffarabad and Gilgit.

Hyderabad and Sialkot ultimately emerged as the preferred choices.

With the addition of two new teams, PSL 11 is set to be the biggest edition of the tournament to date. The upcoming season is scheduled to run from March 26 to May 3.

ISLAMABAD: The Foreign Office on Thursday firmly rejected any suggestion that the Pakistan Air Force could participate in armed conflicts abroad, while condemning statements by India's foreign minister as "irresponsible".

In a weekly media briefing, spokesperson Tahir Andrabi dismissed the Indian foreign minister's remarks made in Luxembourg, calling them an attempt to divert attention from Indian-sponsored terrorism.

He said India should focus on reviewing its own policies rather than lecturing Pakistan, stressing that its accusations cannot hide its anti-peace actions on the international stage.

Highlighting Pakistan's regional stance, Andrabi said Islamabad maintains close cooperation with Saudi Arabia across multiple sectors,



including defence, and strongly opposes any foreign aggression against

Iran.

He added that Pakistan is also

opposed to the use of force by external actors and called for verifiable written assurances from the Afghan Taliban regime to ensure Afghan territory is not used for terrorism.

Addressing questions on the role of the Pakistan Air Force, the spokesperson clarified, "The Pakistan Air Force is not participating in any armed conflict anywhere in the world."

Andrabi also reiterated Pakistan's position on water treaties, emphasising the restoration of the Indus Waters Treaty and opposing India's unilateral suspension of the agreement, stating that India cannot build dams on the Jhelum or Neelum rivers.

Touching on the Kashmir issue, he noted that the right to self-determination day was recently observed.

The spokesperson highlighted that thousands of political leaders remain imprisoned in the Indian-occupied territory.

Salaried class pays Rs266bn income tax in July-Dec 2025: FBR

ISLAMABAD: The salaried class paid Rs266 billion in income tax during July-December 2025, accounting for nearly 10 per cent of the country's total income tax collection, according to sources in the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR).

The tax contribution from salaried individuals was nine per cent higher than the same period of the previous fiscal year, despite what officials describe as one of the highest tax burdens on wage earners in Pakistan.

FBR data shows that the salaried class is paying around 38 per cent of its income in taxes.

Sources said employees in Pakistan face a heavier direct tax burden compared to other segments of the economy.

Breaking down the figures, non-corporate salaried employees contributed Rs117 billion in income tax, reflecting a 14 per cent increase year-on-year.

Employees in the corporate

sector paid Rs82 billion during the six-month period.

Provincial government employees paid Rs39 billion in income tax, marking a seven per cent decline compared to last year, while federal government employees contributed a combined Rs27 billion, according to FBR sources.

Meanwhile, withholding tax collections from the real estate sector rose sharply.

Receipts from real estate withholding tax reached Rs126 billion, up 17 per cent from the previous year.

Withholding tax on the sale of plots surged by nearly two-thirds to Rs87 billion.

In contrast, tax collection on the purchase of plots fell by 29 per cent to Rs39 billion, indicating subdued buying activity in the property market.

Officials said the figures highlight a growing reliance on salaried individuals and withholding taxes for revenue collection amid broader challenges in expanding the tax base.
