

CM Punjab chairs fifth meeting on clean drinking water supply

LAHORE: Chief Minister Punjab Maryam Nawaz Sharif on Monday chaired the fifth consecutive meeting on the provision of clean drinking water, reviewing proposed measures for ensuring water supply in various districts of Punjab.

The meeting reviewed water supply pipeline projects in Chakwal, Rawalpindi, Rajanpur, Faisalabad, Murree and Attock. It agreed in principle to prioritise water supply to eight water-scarce villages in Chakwal.

A proposal for pilot water supply projects in Rajanpur, Jampur, Chak Shigari and Dajal was also considered. The meeting agreed to launch a pilot project to provide drinking water in Chak Jhumra and suburban areas of Faisalabad.

The chief minister directed the authorities to compile and verify reliable data on water requirements according to population. She ordered the immediate provision of 21 water bowers in Rajanpur and directed the authorities to expedite beautification and other development projects in Rojhan.

CM Punjab also ordered the provision of water tanks for drinking water supply in Murree and directed work on



a new water source in the hill station.

The Punjab Clean Water Authority and deputy commissioners gave detailed briefings on the water supply situation and ongoing projects in the districts.

The meeting was informed that Chakwal has 32 functional water filtration plants, while 237 are under construction. Fifteen model villages and 13 model villages are also being developed.

Rawalpindi has 246 existing water filtration plants, while 252 new plants are to be installed. Attock has 77 existing filtration plants, 399 under completion and nine model villages planned.

Rajanpur has 146 existing filtration

plants, with 191 under completion. Twelve model villages and one model village are also planned there.

Murree has five existing water filtration plants, while 90 are under completion. Faisalabad has 343 existing filtration plants, four surface water treatment plants and 180 filtration plants under completion.

JST Candidates Protest in Hyderabad, Demand Cut-Off Score Be Lowered to 50

HYDERABAD: Candidates who scored 50 to 54 marks in the Junior Science Teacher (JST) test held a peaceful protest outside the Hyderabad Press Club, demanding the Sindh government reduce the qualifying cut-off from 55 to 50 marks.

Led by Rida, Kaneez Fatima, Aqib Mumtaz and others, the protesters said candidates with 50+ marks have already waited nearly five years for jobs. During this delay, many have exhausted age relaxation for government posts and risk becoming ineligible for future vacancies.



They argued that 50 marks is accepted as passing in several insti-

tutions across Sindh and Pakistan, including the Teacher Licensing Test

conducted by Sukkur IBA. Candidates scoring 50-54 are only a few marks behind those with 55, and disqualifying them over such a narrow gap is unfair, they said.

The candidates also complained that Sukkur IBA issued the JST syllabus very late, leaving little time for preparation. In those circumstances, securing over 50 marks should be considered a significant achievement.

They appealed to Sindh Education Minister Sardar Shah to adopt a flexible policy, reduce the cut-off to 50, and issue offer letters to all eligible candidates with 50 marks or above.

Ayaz meets Speaker KPK

Kashmir Community International Urges PML-N to Nominate Haji Ehsan Danish for AJK Overseas Seat

JEDDAH, Saudi Arabia: Jammu & Kashmir Community International has appealed to PML-N President Mian Muhammad Nawaz Sharif and PML-N AJK President Shah Ghulam Qadir to nominate Haji Ehsan Danish for the Overseas seat in the Azad Jammu & Kashmir Legislative Assembly.

In a joint statement, Chairman Ghulam Nabi Butt, Senior Vice Chairman Sardar Kamran Azam, General Secretary Raja Pervez Ahmed, and other office bearers said Danish is a respected Saudi-based political, social and business personality with a long record of service to the Pakistani and Kashmiri diaspora.

They noted that the Overseas seat has traditionally gone to representatives from Europe, especially the UK, while the Middle East, particularly Saudi Arabia, has remained overlooked. With a large Kashmiri and Pakistani community in the region playing a key role through remittances, they said nominating Danish would address underrepresentation and recognize the contributions of Kashmiris in Saudi Arabia and the wider Middle East.



Makkah Defence Pact Heralds New Era of Unity in Muslim World

FAISALABAD: Sahibzada Hafiz Muhammad Amjad, Member of the Council of Islamic Ideology Pakistan and Chairman Ulama Mashaaikh Pakistan, has welcomed the defence agreement between Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Türkiye signed in Makkah, calling it a significant step toward Muslim unity, mutual trust, regional peace and stability.

He expressed hope the historic cooperation would strengthen unity and set a positive example for regional stability.

Pakistan assumes presidency of UN Conference on Disarmament

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan assumed the Presidency of the United Nations Conference on Disarmament (CD) in Geneva on Monday.

On Pakistan's behalf, Ambassador Tahir Hussain Andrabi, Additional Secretary (Arms Control and Disarmament) and Spokesperson, is presiding over the meetings of the CD.

According to a press release, Pakistan holds the final Presidency of the Conference's 2026 session and will therefore conclude its proceedings for the year. During its Presidency, Pakistan will steer negotiations on the Annual Report of the CD and the corresponding resolution in the First Committee of the UN General Assembly.

Pakistan has initiated consultations in its role as President of the CD. Ambassador Tahir Hussain Andrabi chaired a meeting of the previous Presidents of the Conference for the 2026 session and held consultations with representatives of the regional groups.

The United Nations Conference on Disarmament is the world's single multilateral forum for negotiating disarmament and arms control treaties. Based at the United Nations Office at Geneva, it brings together 65 member states, including all States possessing nuclear weapons.

Mian Zahid Hussain Welcomes Makkah Defence Pact

KARACHI: Mian Zahid Hussain, President of the Pakistan Businessmen and Intellectuals Forum and All Karachi Industrial Alliance, has praised the Makkah Joint Defence Agreement signed by Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Türkiye on August 7, 2026, calling it a landmark step toward collective security and deeper economic cooperation among Muslim nations. Under the pact, an attack on any one signatory would be treated as an attack on all three. He noted Turkish leadership has signaled the framework could eventually expand to other regional countries.

Highlighting its scale, Hussain said the combined economies of the three



nations total roughly \$3.33 trillion — Türkiye (\$1.6 trillion), Saudi Arabia (\$1.3 trillion), and Pakistan (\$452 billion) — with a combined population exceeding 370 million and a

joint defence budget of nearly \$125 billion. He described the alliance as merging Pakistan's nuclear capability, Saudi economic strength, and Turkish defence technology expertise into a major regional strategic bloc.

Hussain emphasized significant economic opportunities for Pakistani businesses, including joint ventures and exports in defence engineering, IT, pharmaceuticals, textiles, agriculture, and energy. He urged integrating Pakistani manufacturers into emerging defence and industrial supply chains, and channeling Saudi investment and Turkish technology into Pakistan's export sectors.

He credited Pakistan's performance during Marka-e-Haq and Operation

Bunyan-ul-Marsoos for boosting the country's strategic credibility, and praised Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, and Deputy PM/Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar for their roles in finalizing the agreement.

Noting plans for a ministerial mechanism and permanent secretariat in Saudi Arabia, Hussain called for a trilateral economic roadmap featuring a joint business council, investment facilitation, industrial projects, and stronger chamber-to-chamber ties. He said FPCCI stands ready to help strengthen economic relations among the three countries, adding that the pact's real success will be measured through investment, exports, and job creation.

Those in whose own Sindh government everything from electric fans to entire examination centres gets booked will question us? Those where 'Shishtam' has a particular meaning will question us?"

Azma Bokhari said that scandals take place in Sindh, not Punjab. "If there is any irregularity in Punjab, the Chief Minister and her team themselves bring it to light; they do not protect anyone," she added.

MD Horticulture Agency Lahore Conducts Surprise Visits to Directorates

PRA Issues Guidelines for Digital Receipts at Restaurants, Hotels in Punjab

LAHORE: The Punjab Revenue Authority (PRA) has issued comprehensive guidelines for customers at restaurants, hotels and coffee shops across Punjab to ensure transparency in tax payments and proper issuance of digital receipts. Under the new rules, businesses cannot issue kitchen orders, unpaid bills, pre-bills or temporary bills to customers. All food chains, restaurants, hotels and coffee shops must prominently display the guidelines at their premises. The PRA urged citizens to obtain a digital receipt only after payment and to verify the business name, address, and Punjab Taxpayer Registration Number (PNTN) on it. Each digital receipt must include order details, applicable tax rate, amount before tax, total amount, PRA invoice number and PRA QR code. Customers can scan the QR code to verify transaction details. The spokesperson advised lodging complaints if businesses refuse digital or card payments via PRA's social media, PRA Sahulat app, or WhatsApp at 0343-0000772. PRA emphasized that digital receipts are key to protecting tax revenue for Punjab's development and prosperity.

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Planting Trees Is Not Enough—Pakistan Must Protect Them

Pakistan's Monsoon Tree Plantation Campaign 2026 comes at a time when environmental protection has become an urgent national priority. The President's call to plant 20 million saplings across the country is an important reminder that forests are not simply sources of greenery; they are essential to biodiversity, water security, soil protection, air quality and climate resilience.

Pakistan faces increasingly serious environmental challenges, including extreme heat, water scarcity, land degradation and climate-related disasters. Forests can play a vital role in addressing these pressures. They protect watersheds, reduce soil erosion, support wildlife and help communities adapt to changing climatic conditions. In cities, trees provide shade and contribute to healthier living environments, while rural communities depend on forests for resources such as fruit and fodder.

The government's initiatives, including the Upscaling Green Pakistan Programme, mangrove restoration, sustainable forest management and community-based conservation, represent important steps toward strengthening the country's environmental resilience. However, plantation campaigns should not be judged simply by the number of saplings planted. The real measure of success is how many of those saplings survive, mature and become healthy forests.

This distinction is crucial. Every year, millions of trees may be planted during seasonal campaigns, but without adequate watering, protection, monitoring and community involvement, a significant portion of new plantations may fail to survive. Therefore, every plantation drive should be accompanied by a clear maintenance and monitoring mechanism. Relevant departments must identify planting sites carefully, select suitable indigenous species and assign responsibility for protecting newly planted trees.

Public participation is equally important. The responsibility for environmental protection cannot rest entirely with government departments. Educational institutions, local communities, businesses, civil society organizations and, particularly, young people should become active partners in protecting the country's natural resources. A sapling planted by a student, family or community should be regarded as a long-term responsibility rather than a one-day activity.

Pakistan's commitments under international environmental agreements and sustainable development frameworks also make forest conservation an important national obligation. Yet international commitments will have meaning only when they produce visible improvements at the local level.

The Monsoon Tree Plantation Campaign should therefore become part of a continuous national environmental strategy. Protecting existing forests must receive as much attention as planting new ones. Illegal cutting, uncontrolled development and degradation of natural ecosystems can undermine years of plantation efforts.

The President's message rightly emphasizes that the campaign is more than a plantation drive. It is a call for sustained environmental responsibility. Pakistan needs millions of healthy, mature trees—not merely millions of planted saplings.

If government institutions and citizens work together to plant, protect and nurture trees, the campaign can contribute meaningfully to a greener, cleaner and more climate-resilient Pakistan. The trees planted today are an investment in the health, security and prosperity of future generations.

A Nation's Real Strength Rests in Spirituality, Not Military Might

A striking observation by a renowned Jewish religious scholar widely circulated in social and traditional media that Muslims cannot be defeated through conventional military means alone raises a question far larger than the conflict in which his remarks are being circulated.

He attributes Muslim resilience to spiritual strength rooted in faith, prayer, sacrifice and an understanding of life and death extending beyond material existence. His observation points toward a broader proposition: military superiority may destroy physical capabilities, but it does not necessarily vanquish a people whose spiritual foundations remain intact.

History repeatedly demonstrates the distinction between defeating an army and defeating a nation. Armies may be destroyed, governments removed, economies crippled and territories occupied, yet a people can recover if their faith, identity and collective conviction survive.

This phenomenon is not peculiar to Islam. Judaism, Christianity, Hinduism, Buddhism and other great religious traditions have endured persecution, displacement and political upheaval because something deeper than material strength continued to sustain their communities.

In Islam, this spiritual foundation begins with iman: belief in Allah, His angels, His revealed books, His prophets and messengers, and the Hereafter. These

convictions find practical manifestation through the declaration of faith, five daily prayers, fasting, zakat and pilgrimage to Makkah.

Together they cultivate discipline, sacrifice, accountability and attachment to purposes transcending material life. The stronger this relationship between belief and practice becomes, the more profoundly it shapes the believer's response to fear, hardship, suffering and death.

This is where conventional deterrence encounters a different equation. Military power normally seeks to raise the cost of resistance until surrender appears preferable to continued suffering. But a person who regards earthly existence as temporary, sacrifice as meaningful and death as a transition rather than absolute extinction may calculate those costs differently.

Physical destruction remains painful, but its capacity to compel submission diminishes when the convictions sustaining resistance are stronger than fear.

The Jewish scholar's observation becomes particularly significant in this context. The strength confronting an army is not merely the weapon carried by a fighter but the conviction residing within the person carrying it. A missile can be destroyed, an installation demol-

ished and an army weakened, yet if the belief system producing courage and endurance survives, resistance can regenerate. The deeper contest therefore extends beyond weapons to the spiritual foundations sustaining collective purpose.

This introduces another dimension of confrontation. If spiritual conviction strengthens a population, weakening

that conviction becomes another means of weakening resistance. Doubt may be directed toward fundamental beliefs; attachment to worship may be eroded; materialism may displace spiritual purpose; internal divisions may be encouraged; and

succeeding generations may gradually become detached from the traditions through which religious identity is renewed. The battlefield then extends beyond territory into the mind, heart and spiritual consciousness of society.

Religious communities, however, are not without spiritual guardianship. Islam has its scholars, shaykhs, Sufi traditions and awliya, just as other religions possess their own spiritually accomplished personalities and inherited traditions of guidance. Within Islamic spiritual understanding, accomplished figures have historically strengthened belief, preserved sacred knowledge and exercised responsibility for communi-

ties entrusted to their care. Their role has often been to reinforce faith precisely when political, cultural or external pressures threatened to weaken it.

The history of Islam offers powerful examples. Across the Indian subcontinent, Indonesia, Malaysia and other parts of Asia, Islam frequently established deep social roots not primarily through military conquest but through merchants, scholars, Sufi shaykhs and spiritual personalities. Their influence came through character, teaching, service, devotion and spiritual attraction. Khanqahs, zawiya and religious circles became centers of learning, charity and community cohesion, allowing spiritual influence to reach where political authority or military force never could.

This history illuminates the concept of spiritual jurisdiction. Within the religious framework, highly attained personalities carry responsibility not only for individual disciples but for wider communities or territories. They strengthen faith, respond to spiritual disturbances, preserve unity and protect the religious consciousness of those within their sphere. If a community's spiritual foundations are challenged, such guardians seek to fortify belief and practice and, within this understanding, counter hostile spiritual influence through their own spiritual resources.

The same broad principle appears in different forms across other religions. Judaism has its rabbis, sages and mystical

DG ISPR's Press Conference: Strategic Signals and National Priorities

The recent press conference by ISPR Director General Lieutenant General Ahmed Sharif Chaudhry outlined Pakistan's strategic direction and national priorities, covering security, governance, economic stability, terrorism, and external interference. Lasting more than two hours in Rawalpindi, the briefing went beyond a routine security update by addressing sensitive national issues with operational data, charts, and presentations, emphasizing transparency and providing the military's perspective on the country's security environment and long-term plans. A key message was that good governance is indispensable for lasting security and that military action alone cannot eliminate terrorism without stronger administrative and institutional capacity. The DG ISPR described security and governance as interdependent, identified the National Action Plan (NAP) as the consensus framework for countering extremism, disrupting terror financing, and strengthening institutions, and suggested reviewing whether Pakistan's four-province administrative structure adequately serves a population of around 240–250 million. He said any administrative changes should be decided by the political leadership through constitutional and legal processes reflecting the will of the people, while reaffirming the military's security role and civilian authority over political and administrative reforms within the constitutional framework.

The DG ISPR also presented extensive data on counterterrorism operations, stating that security forces conducted 40,348 intelli-

gence-based operations in 2026—nearly 200 daily—including over 31,000 in Balochistan. He reported 3,145 terrorism incidents nationwide, with 1,971 in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, 1,148 in Balochistan, and 26 elsewhere, resulting in 2,084 confirmed terrorists killed, an average of 10 per day that he described as the highest operational ratio in the country's history. He added that 819 Pakistanis had lost their lives in the fight against terrorism, including 303 army personnel, 194 police and law enforcement officials, and 322 civilians, while noting that 28 suicide bombings occurred nationwide, most of which he alleged were carried out by Afghan nationals, underscoring the need for effective border management and regional cooperation. Clarifying the concept of a "hard state," he said it does not mean military rule or authoritarianism but rather equal enforcement of the Constitution and rule of law, resolution of all matters through constitutional and legal mechanisms, equality before the law, stronger institutions, accountability, and protection of democratic rights and freedoms. Addressing Balochistan, he rejected claims that the security situation is worsening, alleged that some elite groups and tribal leaders have historically resisted social progress to preserve their influence, and said the state aims to empower ordinary citizens, address genuine grievances, and continue operations against militant groups. He outlined ongoing socio-economic initiatives, including investments worth billions of rupees, projects such as the Mangi Dam, Kachhi Canal, and Pakistan Expressway, completion of 52 dams under the 100 Dams Project, establishment of 16 educational institutions and two

healthcare facilities each month, and support for shrimp farming and farmer loans under the Balochistan Green Initiative to create jobs, improve living standards, and address the underlying causes of insurgency.

The DG ISPR also addressed the situation in Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK), making it clear that the state would not allow any unrest to derail the democratic and constitutional process. He stressed that political issues should be resolved through democratic and constitutional means, and that the state's role is to ensure a peaceful environment where democratic institutions can function effectively. He stated that the state has acted with restraint in dealing with recent unrest and that the electoral process would continue without disruption, ensuring that the will of the people is expressed through the ballot box. He reiterated Pakistan's long-standing and unwavering position on Kashmir, describing it as the unfinished agenda of the Partition of the Subcontinent and central to the country's national policy. He firmly rejected any claims that the Pakistan Army is an occupying force in AJK, clarifying that security matters in the region are handled by the AJK government, its police, and civilian law enforcement agencies. This clarification was important to counter the false narratives that seek to undermine Pakistan's moral and legal position on the Kashmir dispute.

A recurring and powerful theme throughout the press conference was the issue of external interference, with the DG ISPR pointing a clear finger at India. He alleged that after failing to achieve its objectives through direct confrontation, India has increasingly turned to proxy warfare. He claimed that over three hundred Indian websites are actively working to foment terrorism in Balochistan and that a staggering fifty-four percent of the propaganda against

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5 Key Takeaways from PML-N's Unity and Development Message in Azad Kashmir

The meeting of the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) Azad Jammu and Kashmir parliamentary party in Murree was more than a routine political gathering. The presence of PML-N President Muhammad Nawaz Sharif, Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif and Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz Sharif gave the event considerable political and emotional importance. More importantly, the meeting conveyed a message of reconciliation, loyalty to party workers, confidence in Azad Kashmir's future and a commitment to development.

One of the most significant aspects of the gathering was Nawaz Sharif's treatment of unsuccessful election candidates. While newly elected members were congratulated, defeated candidates including Mushtaq Minhas, Barrister Iftikhar Gilani, Chaudhry Muhammad Saeed and Engineer Mohsin Aziz were also given an opportunity to speak about their experiences. This gesture reflected a political culture in which loyalty is not measured only by electoral victory. The message was that defeat does not necessarily represent political failure, especially when candidates have remained committed to their party and democratic principles under difficult circumstances.

Nawaz Sharif's comments on the political situation in Azad Kashmir were equally important. Rather than using recent unrest and political tensions to intensify polarization, he focused attention on the underlying causes of public frustration, including governance fail-

ures, unmet expectations and delayed solutions to public problems. His emphasis on political tolerance was particularly relevant, as democratic disagreement should not develop into personal hostility or permanently damage social relationships.

The meeting also placed the recent electoral performance of the PML-N in the broader context of Nawaz Sharif's political vision.

The gathering recalled the historical role of the Muslim League in the creation of Pakistan and argued that Nawaz Sharif contributed to restoring the party's political identity through a modern developmental agenda focused on economic growth, infrastructure, public services, stability and social progress. The electoral process in Azad Kashmir, however, remains incomplete, with seven constituencies in Poonch and Sudhnoti still awaiting completion.

A central theme of the meeting was the future development of Azad Kashmir. The region possesses considerable natural beauty and human potential but faces serious challenges related to employment, tourism, transportation, healthcare, education and communications, particularly because of its mountainous geography. Proposed initiatives involving CPEC-related development, possible rail connectivity between Murree and Muzaffarabad, improved hospitals, better roads, tourism infrastructure and employment opportunities were presented as components of a broader development vision. The objective should be integrated development connecting towns and villages with markets,

Minister announces 400-acre Port Qasim garment city project, 138,000 jobs projected

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Maritime Affairs Muhammad Junaid Anwar Chaudhry has announced plans to establish a 400-acre apparel zone at Port Qasim, with its first phase projected to create more than 138,000 jobs and generate annual exports of around \$2.2 billion.

Chairing a meeting on a proposed garment city project, the minister said the export-oriented manufacturing cluster would focus on high-value apparel production and attract private investment.

According to the project plan, the first phase would cover 250 acres, with 35 per cent allocated for internal roads, utilities and green areas. The project is envisaged as a public-private partnership.

The proposed commercial structure comprises 32 industrial plots of five acres each, although the plot size could be reduced to two or three acres to accommodate more investors and manufacturing units.

The Port Qasim Authority (PQA) would provide infrastructure and utilities. Each industrial unit would have access to up to 400,000 gallons of water a day, two megawatts of on-grid electricity and 23,100 pounds of industrial gas a day at 8 pounds per square inch (PSI), enough to support requirements for 10 tonnes of steam.

Pounds per square inch (PSI) is a unit used to measure pressure. It indicates how much force is applied over one square inch of area. For example, 8 PSI means eight pounds of force acting on each square inch.

For the overall project, planned utility capacity includes 13 million gallons of water a day, 64MW of on-grid electricity and 750,000 pounds of industrial gas a day. Junaid Chaudhry said private-sector participation would be a key component of the project. Under the plan, a Pakistani textile and denim manufacturing company, Artistic Milliners, would establish a manufacturing unit with an investment of more than \$18 million, incorporating vertical integration and green technologies.

The project would also have a one-window mechanism for exporters, including streamlined export processing, specialised customs desks and dedicated transport corridors.

Projections presented at the meeting put first-phase employment at 138,125 jobs and annual exports at \$2.2bn. The project also aims to raise the average export value of garments to around \$8 per piece. The minister said the initiative was part of efforts to expand Pakistan's industrial base and export capacity, with port infrastructure, utilities, customs facilities and private investment integrated into the proposed apparel zone.

Russian MFA Spokeswoman Comments on US-Türkiye Arms Plans for Ukraine

MOSCOW: Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova commented on reports that the United States and Türkiye plan to transfer a substantial shipment of US-made weapons currently held by Türkiye to Ukraine. Citing documents recently released by the US Congress, she said the potential arsenal is considerable and includes offensive weapons — reportedly 12 multiple rocket launch systems, more than 2,500 unguided cluster munitions, 47,000 203mm cluster shells,



and 70 ATACMS short-range missiles. Zakharova said numerous

contradictions and inconsistencies remain regarding the circumstances of the planned

transfer, including who initiated the re-export, how the weapons would be transported, and when the shipment might reach Ukraine. She questioned the reasoning behind the US-Türkiye decision, arguing it would prolong the conflict and cause further casualties without altering the course of what Moscow calls its "special military operation."

She argued the deliveries would cause broader damage beyond the battlefield, including serious harm to Russia's bilateral relations with Washington and Ankara. She said this is particularly

significant given that Turkish authorities had previously assured Moscow they would refrain from supplying lethal weapons to Kyiv, and argued that combining peace-oriented rhetoric with arms transfers undermines mutual trust between the countries.

Zakharova said the Russian Foreign Ministry has formally requested explanations from both Washington and Ankara regarding the reported plans, and expressed hope that there is still time for a more measured assessment of the situation before any shipment proceeds.

International Literacy Day 2026: Keeping the Gate of 'Iqra' Open

International Literacy Day is observed every year on September 8, providing an opportunity to reflect on the importance of education and literacy in building prosperous, peaceful and progressive societies. For the "Classmate Brothers of 1960" in Tatrinite, Azad Jammu and Kashmir, however, the occasion carries a deeply personal meaning. It is an opportunity to revisit their educational roots and renew their commitment to the institution where their learning journey began.

The writer began his educational journey in 1960 at Fatima Jinnah Primary School, Tatrinite, where early lessons included

"Alif: Allah, Bay: Bismillah, Pay: Pakistan and Tay: Talwar." Sixty-five years later, the classmates returned to their mother institution and found that, despite the passage of decades, many of its basic facilities had changed little. The school has since been upgraded to a higher secondary institution, but the group believes that its facilities and educational role should correspond to the growing population and needs of the surrounding area.

The visit became a moment of reflection. The classmates observed classrooms and facilities that, in their view, remain inadequate compared with the standards of developed countries. They also recognized the efforts of Principal Arbab Faizi, whom they describe as an educated and

committed educationist seeking support from the government and the community to improve the institution.

The group believes that improving education requires sustained public investment, effective planning and cooperation between government and citizens. A school cannot become a centre of excellence without adequate classrooms, qualified teachers, learning resources, laboratories, libraries and a safe and encouraging educational environment.

One of the most worrying observations was the school's relatively low enrollment of around 200 students despite the surrounding population. According to the classmates, some parents prefer private or

distant institutions because of the lack of facilities and educational confidence in the local school. Families unable to afford such alternatives may consequently face greater difficulties in ensuring regular education for their children.

The "Classmate Brothers of 1960" responded to the situation by making a financial contribution for urgent needs and pledging to approach government departments, community members and other stakeholders for additional support. They also began encouraging parents to reconsider enrolling children who had previously left the school.

Their campaign is rooted in a simple but powerful belief: education is not merely a personal

advantage; it is the foundation of national development. The first revealed command associated with the Holy Quran, "Iqra" — read — symbolizes the transformative power of knowledge. Societies that invest in education create opportunities for their young people, strengthen institutions and develop the human resources required for economic and scientific progress.

The classmates also argue that Pakistan's national security and development are closely connected with knowledge. The country's achievements in science and technology demonstrate what can be accomplished when education, expertise and determination are given priority. Maintaining progress requires continuous investment in schools,

universities, research and professional training.

International Literacy Day should therefore not remain limited to ceremonies, speeches and slogans. It should become a reminder that every child deserves access to quality education. Governments must ensure that schools in rural and remote areas receive attention equal to institutions in major cities.

The commitment of the "Classmate Brothers of 1960" offers a valuable example of community responsibility. Although many members of the group live and work in different places, including overseas, they continue to remain connected with their mother institution and have pledged to celebrate International Literacy Day there each

year.

Their message is ultimately one of hope. Challenges may be numerous, and progress may sometimes appear slow, but education remains the most powerful instrument for transforming communities. If government, teachers, parents, former students and the wider community work together, Fatima Jinnah Higher Secondary School can regain its reputation and become a stronger educational centre for Tatrinite and surrounding areas.

International Literacy Day 2026 should therefore be a renewed call to keep the gate of "Iqra" open — not only for one school, but for every child who deserves the opportunity to learn, dream and build a better future.

of corporate debt securities, PSX listings, Sukuk and other Shariah-compliant debt instruments.

A dedicated Corporate Debt Market section has also been established on the SECP website, providing the relevant legal and regulatory framework, market data, guidance material, and contact details of the focal person.

Chairman SECP Dr. Kabir Ahmed Sidhu said a deeper corporate debt market would diversify long-term financing, mobilize institutional investment and support infrastructure and industrial growth.

The Desk forms part of SECP's broader corporate debt market reforms aimed at simplifying issuance processes, reducing costs and standardizing documentation to encourage greater participation by issuers and investors.

PPL Makes First-
Ever Jurassic Gas-
Condensate Discovery
in Lower Indus Basin at
Dolphin X-1

KARACHI: Pakistan Petroleum Limited (PPL) has announced a pioneering gas and condensate discovery from its exploratory well Dolphin X-1 in the Sirani Block, District Sujawal, Sindh.

This is the first-ever hydrocarbon discovery from the Jurassic-age Chiltan Formation in the Lower Indus Basin, opening a new hydrocarbon play across onshore marshy areas and possible extensions into shallow offshore.

The well was spud on April 17, 2026 and drilled to 3,850m. During testing, the Chiltan Formation flowed

0.942 MMscfd of good quality gas with 1000 Btu/scf heating value at 211 psig on a 32/64" choke.

PPL, operator with 75% Working Interest and GHPL with 25%, used specialized transition equipment to acquire 2D/3D seismic in the challenging marshy terrain — an area long considered inaccessible.

The company credited PM Shehbaz Sharif and Federal Petroleum Minister Ali Pervaiz Malik for enabling frontier exploration, and acknowledged Pakistan Navy's support. Preliminary data suggests a tight reservoir, with further evaluation underway.

Goods Transporters’ Strike: How Many Billions Will the Economy Lose as the Wheels Come to a Halt?

Pakistan's economy is currently at a crossroads where the continuity of every economic activity is of exceptional importance for national stability, foreign exchange reserves, industrial production and employment. Against this backdrop, the ongoing nationwide wheel-jam strike by goods transporters is no longer merely a protest by the transport sector; it has become a serious threat to the entire supply chain of the national economy.

The strike, which began on August 8, is still continuing. Despite several rounds of negotiations between the government and transporters, the deadlock persists and goods transportation remains at a standstill. The most worrying aspect of the strike is that its effects are no longer confined to the roads. They are spreading to ports, factories, warehouses, industrial units, export centers and international trade.

The suspension of freight movement is disrupting the supply of raw materials, the delivery of finished products and the timely movement of export containers to ports. If the situation continues for much longer, Pakistan could face not only direct financial losses but also indirect economic losses running into billions of rupees and potentially far more.

According to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics' monthly summary for July 2026, the country's exports stood at Rs817.246 billion. On a 31-day basis, this amounts to approximately Rs26.36 billion per day. This does not mean that Pakistan is necessarily losing Rs26.36 billion in exports for every day of the strike. However, the figure does provide an indication of the scale of economic

activity that depends on an efficient transportation, port and logistics system.

If export consignments fail to reach ports on schedule, delays in their shipment can put pressure on export earnings, foreign exchange inflows and industrial production.

Pakistan's textile and apparel sector is particularly important in this regard. A significant portion of the country's exports is linked to this sector, and its entire supply chain depends on the timely availability of raw materials, production, packaging of finished goods and the transportation of export cargo to ports. A transporters' strike disrupts each of these interconnected stages.

The seriousness of the situation can be gauged from the fact that exporters may have already completed production, quality inspections, documentation and shipping bookings. Yet if a container cannot move from a factory or warehouse to the port at the final stage, the entire export chain is affected. In global trade, producing goods is not enough; delivering them on time to the designated port and vessel is equally important.

International shipping operates according to strict schedules. Export containers must reach terminals before designated cut-off times. If a container fails to arrive on time, it may not be loaded onto the scheduled vessel and could have to wait until the next sailing. This can disrupt shipping bookings, delay deliveries and generate additional

costs. Detention, demurrage, terminal storage and handling charges can impose an additional financial burden on exporters.

The problem is not limited to the financial loss associated with a single export order. International buyers place great importance on timely delivery. If exporters from a particular country repeatedly fail to meet delivery schedules, international buyers may begin looking for alternative suppliers. Thus, a temporary transport crisis could, over the longer term, damage Pakistan's export competitiveness and market share.

The strike is also affecting the supply of industrial raw materials. Imported raw materials are being held up at ports, while local cotton and other industrial inputs are facing difficulties in reaching mills and factories. If the situation persists, some industrial units may be forced to reduce production or temporarily shut down.

Here, it is important to understand a fundamental economic principle: economic output is not generated inside factories alone; it is generated through the continuity of the entire supply chain. If raw materials do not reach factories, finished goods cannot move from warehouses to markets, and export containers cannot reach ports, economic activity can come to a halt even when productive capacity remains available.

The transporters' position also cannot be ignored. Their demands reportedly include issues relating to

taxes, the alleged unlawful detention of vehicles, excessive toll taxes and other fundamental concerns. If government representatives have already acknowledged some of these demands as legitimate, there is little economic justification for further delaying a resolution.

Allowing a dispute between the government and transporters to escalate to the point where industrial production and exports begin to suffer could prove to be an extremely costly policy mistake.

It is also important to recognize that the transport sector serves as the backbone of Pakistan's economy. Large volumes of raw materials, agricultural produce, industrial goods, imported merchandise and export cargo are transported from one location to another primarily by road. A prolonged disruption in the transport sector is therefore comparable to an obstruction in the circulation of blood through the economic system.

The government's immediate priority should be to end the strike, but not merely through temporary assurances. Similar issues have resurfaced in the past after negotiations and verbal commitments. This time, the government should enter into a clear, written and workable agreement with transporters, specifying their demands, implementation deadlines and the responsibilities of the relevant institutions.

At the same time, emergency measures are needed to protect exporters from the immediate consequences of the strike. Port authorities, terminal operators, shipping lines, customs authorities and freight forwarders should provide special facilities for affected export containers. Where possible, vessel

cut-off times should be extended, stranded containers should be moved on a priority basis, and appropriate relief should be provided on additional storage, detention and demurrage charges arising from the strike.

The government must also draw a long-term lesson from the crisis. Pakistan needs to integrate its logistics policy into its national export strategy rather than treating logistics merely as an issue of roads and toll plazas. In a modern economy, ports, railways, highways, trucking, warehouses, customs and digital freight systems operate as an integrated logistics network. Unless Pakistan undertakes reforms in this sector, achieving ambitious export targets will remain difficult.

Rail freight also needs to be modernized so that dependence on roads for long-distance transportation can be reduced. Similarly, the trucking sector requires a permanent institutional framework for digital tracking, a transparent taxation system, uniform regulations, rational toll charges and the resolution of problems faced by drivers and vehicle owners.

Most importantly, a permanent institutional mechanism for coordination between the government, industry and transport sector should be established. This would ensure that stakeholders do not have to wait for roads to be blocked and negotiations to collapse every time a dispute emerges. Holding the national economy hostage between protests and negotiations serves the interests of no stakeholder.

Pakistan is currently trying to increase exports, generate foreign exchange and expand industrial production. In such circumstances, a disruption of more than a week in the export supply chain should be treated as a serious economic warning. If the crisis continues, its consequences will not be limited to today's containers, trucks and factories. In the coming months, the impact could emerge in the form of lost export orders, lower industrial production, employment pressures and declining confidence among international buyers.

The government must therefore decide whether it views the crisis as an ordinary industrial dispute or as a matter of national economic emergency. Under the present circumstances, the latter approach would be more prudent.

Resolving the legitimate concerns of transporters, restoring the movement of export cargo and ensuring the priority transportation of goods stranded at ports are no longer merely administrative measures; they have become matters of national economic necessity.

Pakistan is currently generating export activity worth approximately Rs26.36 billion every day. We cannot strengthen our position in global markets by bringing the wheels of the economy to a standstill on the roads. Both the government and transporters must understand that the longer it takes to return to the negotiating table and resolve the deadlock, the greater the eventual cost will be for the entire economy, industry, exporters, workers and the national exchequer.

The need of the hour is to end the deadlock, get the wheels moving again and protect Pakistan's export-oriented economy from further damage.

Pakistan originates from India. He described a sophisticated mechanism where terrorist incidents are rapidly followed by coordinated online campaigns involving militant organisations and Indian media platforms, designed to magnify fear and project an exaggerated image of instability. He accused India of funding and supporting terror proxies and using psychological warfare and digital propaganda in a desperate attempt to destabilize Pakistan from within. This external dimension, he argued, adds a layer of complexity to the internal security challenges, requiring a comprehensive national response that combines military vigilance with diplomatic and informational countermeasures.

Beyond the immediate security and political issues, the DG ISPR also discussed the critical link between terrorism and the country's economy. He revealed that security forces have conducted operations against illegal economic activities that are harming Pakistan's economy. He stated that smuggled goods worth billions of rupees and narcotics worth eighteen billion rupees have been seized during these operations. He emphasized that certain elements are frustrated by these actions because terrorist groups have strong links with smuggling networks, and a strong state cannot allow such illegal activities to continue. By targeting these economic crimes, the security forces are not only disrupting terrorist financing

but are also protecting the legitimate economic interests of the country, contributing to overall economic stability and growth.

The DG ISPR's press conference has been welcomed by the people of Pakistan who love the Pak Army, as it provided them with a comprehensive and transparent account of the challenges facing the nation and the sacrifices being made to overcome them. education, healthcare, tourism and employment.

Nawaz Sharif's appeal to Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz to provide maximum assistance to Azad Kashmir was therefore significant. Even practical measures suited to the region's difficult terrain, such as improved helicopter facilities, demonstrate the need for development policies adapted to local conditions. Shehbaz Sharif complemented this vision by congratulating successful candidates and assuring elected representatives of federal support. The challenge now is to translate political commitments into measurable improvements in roads, hospitals, education, tourism and employ-

ment.

Maryam Nawaz's participation added a generational dimension to the gathering. Her encouragement of successful candidates and recognition of workers who continued supporting the party during difficult periods reinforced the idea of a broader political family. The participation of senior federal and party leaders further demonstrated coordination between the PML-N's central leadership and its Azad Kashmir organization. Particular attention was given to Poonch and Sudhnoti, where seven constituencies remain part of the electoral process. Such reassurance is important because political attention can sometimes decline after an election phase has ended.

The ultimate test for the PML-N, however, will not simply be the number of seats it wins. The real measure will be what it does with its political mandate. The people of Azad Kashmir need roads that remain functional, hospitals offering modern treatment, educational institutions preparing young people for

a competitive economy, tourism facilities capable of generating sustainable opportunities and employment policies that reduce the pressure on young Kashmiris to leave their communities in search of livelihoods. Development should reach all areas, including Muzaffarabad, Poonch, Sudhnoti, Mirpur, Bagh, Haveli, Neelum and Bhimber.

The deeper significance of the Murree gathering lies in its attempt to shift the political conversation from electoral rivalry toward reconciliation, governance and development. It brought together victory and defeat, leadership and workers, the federal government and Azad Kashmir's political representatives. Nawaz Sharif emphasized unity and loyalty, Shehbaz Sharif represented the challenge of administrative implementa-

tion, while Maryam Nawaz connected the party's established political tradition with a newer generation of leadership.

Azad Kashmir's relationship with Pakistan carries deep historical and emotional significance. The region's mountains and valleys symbolize generations of history, sacrifice and aspirations. Maintaining this relationship requires more than financial allocations and political statements; it requires trust, ownership and effective delivery. The Murree meeting therefore can be viewed as an effort to redefine the political agenda around Azad Kashmir—from confrontation to reconciliation, from grievance to governance and from political competition to development.

Ultimately, elections determine who

receives political authority, but history judges leaders by how they use that authority. For Azad Kashmir, meaningful progress would be reflected in better schools, stronger hospitals, improved roads, expanded tourism, increased employment and greater economic opportunities for communities across the region. Such achievements would represent the most meaningful fulfillment of the electoral mandate and demonstrate that politics can become an instrument of public service. The central message of the Murree gathering was therefore clear: remain united after victory and defeat, preserve dignity despite political disagreements, maintain faith in democratic politics and place the long-term future of Azad Kashmir above the politics of the moment.

A Nation’s Real Strength Rests in Spirituality, Not Military Might

traditions; Christianity its saints, clergy, monastic orders and contemplative lineages; Hinduism its gurus, yogis and spiritual masters; Buddhism its monks, teachers and accomplished practitioners. Their doctrines are different, yet each tradition recognizes personalities whose spiritual attainment gives them responsibilities extending beyond ordinary religious instruction.

This creates, within the spiritual realm, something comparable to deterrence in the physical realm. Spiritual aggression cannot necessarily be assumed to remain unanswered.

A community whose beliefs are challenged may respond by strengthening its own religious foundations, reviving worship, restoring unity and reinforcing the institutions through which sacred knowledge is transmitted. Spiritual attack can therefore generate spiritual defence, and spiritual defence can create counterbalancing pressure. In this sense, religious civilizations possess a form of spiritual strategic depth.

Afghanistan provides a powerful modern illustration of why physical superiority alone cannot guarantee complete victory. The United States and its allies possessed overwhelming

advantages in aircraft, satellites, drones, precision weapons, intelligence and financial resources. The Taliban possessed nothing remotely comparable. Yet after two decades, foreign forces departed and the Taliban returned to Kabul. Political and strategic failures played major roles, but one undeniable factor was that the conviction sustaining resistance was never extinguished.

Iran offers another contemporary illustration. Whatever one's political judgment of Tehran, the ability of Iranian society to withstand immense military, economic and psychological pressure cannot be understood

exclusively through inventories of missiles or military hardware. Religion, nationalism, historical memory, collective sacrifice and a deeply cultivated narrative of resistance have all contributed to national cohesion. Destruction of infrastructure or military assets does not automatically produce collapse when the population continues to perceive endurance as meaningful.

This is precisely why the spiritual dimension matters in strategic calculations. A military installation can be rebuilt. Weapons can be replaced. Economic damage, however severe, can eventually be repaired. But the decisive question is

whether a people still possess the conviction to absorb hardship and rebuild. If the answer remains yes, physical defeat may be temporary. When conviction itself collapses, however, even a materially powerful society may become vulnerable from within.

The lesson is not that one religion must spiritually conquer another. On the contrary, durable spiritual strength comes primarily from strengthening one's own foundations. Muslims strengthen Islam through faith, prayer, knowledge, character, service and unity. Jews preserve Judaism through their sacred traditions and communal institutions. Christians, Hindus and

Buddhists likewise safeguard their civilizations by transmitting their own spiritual inheritance with confidence, discipline and continuity.

That is the deeper importance of the Jewish scholar's observation. A country may possess the world's most sophisticated weapons and still fail to achieve complete victory over a people whose spiritual will survives every physical blow. Conversely, a materially weaker nation may endure overwhelming pressure if its people remain united by deeply rooted belief, disciplined practice and spiritual leadership.
